Chair Crutison called the meeting to order at 5:00pm.

#### I. Public Comment

Chair Crutison welcomed Jerry Huber as a new First 5 Solano Commissioner. Commissioner Huber introduced himself to the Commission, staff, and the public.

Ms. Stumbaugh, Fairfield-Suisun Unified School District (FSUSD), expressed her thanks to the Commission for the parent education grant in the amount of \$100,000/per year which is administered through the adult school. The Solano Parent and Child Education (SPACE) program is its third year of operation and was awarded the Golden Bell Award from the State School Board Association for their Kindergarten Readiness Roundup. Commissioner Speck commented that the Golden Bell Award is very prestigious and there were only two districts in the County that received it. Ms. Stumbaugh invited the Commissioners to come to the third annual Kindergarten Readiness Roundup and assist or observe the program. Ms. Stumbaugh provided each Commissioner an invitation and an informational packet.

#### III. Introduction of 2015 Officers; Chair Appoints Committee Chairs

Chair Crutison presented Commissioner Jay Speck with a plaque of appreciation for his service as the 2014 Commission Chair. Commissioner Speck accepted the plaque and thanked the Commission for their support.

Chair Crutison re-appointed Commissioner Niedziela as Chair of the Program and Community Engagement Committee, and appointed Commissioner Barbosa as Chair of the Systems and Policy Committee.

#### IV. Committee Reports

- A. Systems and Policy Committee
  - 1. Commissioner Barbosa introduced the Business Challenge Grant Fund Policy as a fundraising strategy to incentivize the business community to contribute donations matched by dollars from First 5 Solano. Grants can range from \$1,000 to \$10,000 and will be pre-approved by the Commission. Ms. Gonsalves further explained the Policy and was available for questions.

Debbi Davis from Children's Nurturing Project expressed her support for the Business Challenge Grant Fund Policy.

#### 2. Planning for 2016 and Beyond

Dr. Lori Allio, Hatchual, Tabernik, and Associates (HTA) presented the revised timeline for the Strategic Planning and Collective Impact Activities for 2015, and the Systems Map as of January 7, 2015 for discussion.

Commissioner Barbosa commented that she believes the underlying problem that connects all four sectors of the Systems Map is poverty. Commissioner Hannigan asked if there was a way to identify how many people are served at each of the entities listed on the map. Dr. Allio responded that each agency would have to

individually report the number of people they serve, but it would not accurately reflect the actual number of people utilizing services throughout the County because there would be significant duplication. Commissioner Dean asked if entities listed are currently participating in Collective Impact (CI) and pointed out that the map seemed to be missing potential players. Dr. Allio responded that not all entities are listed, nor are they all participating at this time. The map is intended to show known resources that are available in the County. Commissioner Dean suggested First 5 Solano be included in all four sectors.

Denise Winters from Children's Nurturing Project commented that the Commission is currently supporting data collection on the number of people utilizing services provided by grantees through Persimmony.

Lisa Colvig, Applied Survey Research (ASR), presented a matrix of the potential indicators that best describe the wellbeing of children and families in Solano County by system area and asked Commissioners to provide feedback and suggestions. Ms. Colvig pointed out that the matrix includes indicators that can be measured now, as well as some that are areas of data development. Commissioners provided additional suggested indicators. These indicators will be used as the basis for data collection and monitoring for the Commission's Strategic Planning and Collective Impact framework. ASR will return in April to present the data supporting the indicators.

#### B. Program and Community Engagement Committee

#### 1. 2014 Pre-K Academy Services Report and Recommendations for FY2015/16

Ms. Hunt presented the 2014 Pre-K Academy Report. The 19 sites funded by the Commission administered the Kindergarten Student Entrance Profile (KSEP) that measures social-emotional and cognitive elements of children's readiness to kindergarten. Of the 570 children enrolled, 531 children were assessed. Most of the sites reached full capacity, however, some faced challenges with parents being unable to commit to a full 4 week period.

Commissioner Dean asked if it was possible that low enrollment was due to Pre-K Academies reaching saturation in the respective area. Ms. Ellington answered that there are more children who would benefit from Pre-K Academies, but the bigger challenge is the time commitment during the summer. Commissioner Hannigan suggested adjusting the start and/or end date of the Academies, for example beginning directly after the previous school year or before the next school year.

Commissioner Crane asked if the KSEP was being used in other programs throughout the County. Ms. Ellington responded she is not aware of any. Commissioner Crane suggested that First 5 Solano require any childcare or organization that provides services to children ages 0-5 and receives funding from First 5 Solano use the KSEP assessment.

Recommendations for FY2015/16 include a primary focus on outreach, bilingual staff on site, at least ½ hour of non-class time to allow staff to connect with parents, and the sharing of KSEP results with kindergarten teachers.

2. Ms. Calvo presented the Maternal, Child, and Adolescent Health (MCAH) Needs Assessment Report which provided an overview of the indicators on health and wellbeing of women, infants, children and youth in Solano County. MCAH's recommendations in the Needs Assessment are the continued support of the appropriate policies, legislation and budget action and investing in evidence-based strategies and programs.

#### V. Executive Director's Report

Ms. Harris explained that First 5 Solano staff contacted the eligible grantees and offered assistance in applying for 50 Fund 'Game Changer' Grant in honor of the Super Bowl in Santa Clara in 2016.

Ms. Harris invited the Commissioners to several upcoming events: the Solano Safety Net Summit #8 on January 29, 2015; the premier screening at the Kroc Center of "The Raising of America: Early Childhood and the Future of our Nation" on January 31, 2015; and the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Children and Families Policy Forum at Solano Community College on February 22, 2015.

#### **VI. Commissioner Remarks**

Commissioner Huber commented that he hopes First 5 Solano and MCAH can coordinate their outcomes. Commissioner Hannigan announced the Board has approved an ordinance that establishes a smoke-free work environment at Solano County campuses. Commissioner Speck announced he is being sworn in for a second term.

#### Introduction

The First 5 Solano Children and Families Commission FY2015/16 Proposed Budget is submitted by the required due date to the County Administrator (February 27, 2015). First 5 Solano's Proposed Budget will go before the Solano County Board of Supervisors in June 2015 as part of the overall annual FY2015/16 County Budget.

Additionally, the Commission will also consider allocations of funding to existing grantee agencies to support a one-year extension of its Program Investment Plan, to facilitate and allow time for a Strategic Planning Process.

#### Motion A: Consider approval of the First 5 Solano FY2015/16 Proposed Budget

#### **Budget Summary**

The FY2015/15 Proposed Budget extends the Commission 2012-2015 funding cycle for an additional year to allow for an 18 month strategic planning process. This budget, which represents less than a 1% projected increase in expenditures from FY2014/15, includes approximately \$6.8 million in projected expenditures and approximately \$4.2 million in projected revenues, requiring the utilization of approximately \$2.6 million of the Commission's estimated fund balance of approximately \$8 million to fully fund the Commission's operations and contractual commitments.

Overall revenues are projected to increase \$86,441 (2%) over last year and overall expenses are projected to increase \$28,803 (0.4%) over the prior year.

#### **Budget Assumptions**

The FY2015/16 Projected Budget is built on certain assumptions:

- Proposition 10 tobacco tax revenues and trust account funds will be available as projected;
- First 5 California will meet its match funding obligations for CARES Plus; in addition, First 5
  California will bring forward a funding opportunity for California Quality System of Support
  (CQSS) Initiative;
- Proposition 63 (MHSA/PEI) funds will be available as projected; and
- The State and Federal Budgets do not impact overall County, school and community services, and in turn impact First 5 Solano and its grantees

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> Commission staff have notified the CAO's office that the First 5 Solano budget will be finalized after the Commission reviews and approves its budget at the March 3, 2015 Commission meeting.

Should any of these assumptions change, the Commission will have the opportunity to consider changes to this Budget as needed and appropriate.

#### Revenues

Overall revenues are projected to increase by \$86,441 (2%) over FY2014/15 estimates. This projected increase is primarily due to an adjustment in the Proposition 10 tobacco tax revenue projections, which are not declining as significantly as projected in previous years. There is also a slight increase in interest income with expected interest on the reserves increasing from 0.25% to 0.4%.

The majority of expected overall revenues (79%) continue to be the Proposition 10 tobacco tax revenues. Interest income is up slightly and represents 1% of overall First 5 Solano revenue. Mental Health Services Act Prevention and Early Intervention funds account for 14%. In addition, this year, a small amount has been budgeted for donations (such as Pre-Kindergarten Business Champions) and small grants, which accounts for less than 1% of the overall revenue. First 5 California state match programs remain at 6% with the participation in the CARES Plus and anticipated participation in the California Quality System of Support (CQSS) program, which is replacing the current Child Signature Program.

#### **Expenditures**

First 5 Solano's Proposed Budget represents an overall increase of \$28,803 (0.4%) in expenditures, as the Commission implements a one year extension of 2012-2015 Program Investment Plan. The majority of expenditures (89%) are program expenditures. Approximately 2% is dedicated to evaluation and data collection expenditures. Administrative expenses constitute 9% of the expenditures, which is well below the Administrative Cost cap of 15%.

#### **Programs**

Program Expenditures of \$5,179,073 are included in the proposed budget. Table 1 below is a summary of these allocations which are one year extensions of the 2012-1015 Program Investment Plan.

Contractors are in place for most services. The Commission will consider the reallocation of funding to the contractors listed near the end of this staff report to facilitate the continuation of services for FY2015/16.<sup>2</sup> Exceptions include Pre-Kindergarten Academies, which selection will conclude shortly. In addition, \$77,500 budgeted in collaboration is allocated for continued Collective Impact activities which will be determined as the plan unfolds.

Another change in programs is under the program area of Quality Childcare. This Initiative contains two First 5 California matching programs: CARES Plus and the Child Signature Program (CSP). CARES Plus extends through FY2015/16, while CSP concludes at the end of FY2014/15. First 5 California has been in discussion with Counties and First 5 Association regarding how to best support local communities in the area of Quality Childcare and is proposing to transition CARES Plus and CSP, along with other quality childcare initiatives, into the California Quality System of Support (CQSS) beginning FY2015/16. CQSS will provide a menu of services which local First 5's can select from to further support child care quality in their county. First 5 California will consider allocating funding for this initiative at their April 2015 Commission Meeting and subsequently release an opportunity for funding. As First 5 Solano's FY2015/16 budget is an extension of the 2012-2015 Program Investment Plan, \$105,000 is included in both revenue and expenditure for the same level of effort that was committed to CSP. However, it is unknown at this time what funding will be available from First 5 California and which opportunities will be a best for fit for Solano. Therefore, it may be necessary to adjust this level of revenue and/or expenditure when the funding opportunity becomes available. This may be done through the County's Supplemental Budget process or through accessing Contingency funds, and will be brought forward to the Commission for consideration when available.

The FY2015/16 Proposed Budget also includes the Co-Sponsorship of Conferences/Training Fund at \$50,000. Additionally, the Discretionary Fund is funded at \$305,847 for FY2015/16. This amount includes \$55,847 in rollover funding from FY2014/15 that must be allocated in FY2015/16 in accordance with the Discretionary Fund Policy. If those funds are allocated during FY2014/15, they will no longer be available in FY2015/16.

<u>Community Engagement</u>: The Community Engagement Activities budget has been funded at \$102,000 which is the same level as previous years. The breakdown of Community Engagement budget is represented in Table 2 below:

March 2015 Commission Meeting - FY2015/16 Proposed Budget

While the total Community Engagement budget is the same as what was budgeted in FY2014/15 there are some variations within line items to adjust for modifications over the previous year. In addition, the current Communications/Community Engagement plan is being reviewed and updated to reflect the current community engagement activities of the Commission. The Community Engagement budget may be adjusted through the Committee process to align with the new plan if necessary.

<u>First 5 Futures</u>: The First 5 Futures budget is again set at \$352,000. The breakdown of the First 5 Futures budget is represented in Table 3 below:

The total First 5 Futures budget is also the same as what was budgeted in FY2014/15, with some variations within line items to adjust for modifications over the previous year.

#### **Evaluation and Data Collection**

The FY2015/16 proposed budget for evaluation/data collection services of \$170,000 continuing contracts for both data collection and evaluation.

#### **Staffing**

The FY2015/16 proposed budget includes 7.0 FTEs (same as FY2014/15) and 4 Extra Help staff (one Office Assistant and 3 College Interns). The proposed budget of \$991,671 is a \$56,190 or 5% decrease over the FY2014/15 budget. The decrease is primarily due to new staff coming in at lower salary steps than previous staff.

#### Services and Supplies

Operational costs are projected to decrease by \$51,053, or 20%. This decrease is attributable to the following primary factors:

- Increase in Maintenance and Building Improvements of \$35,442 to account for the unspent funding for the renovation of 275 Beck Ave childcare facility
- Increase in Consulting Services of \$9,500 to complete Strategic Planning and Collective Impact Planning
- Decrease in Legal Services of \$47,984 to account for the resolution of AB99

 Decrease of Rents & Leases-Building by \$45,000 due to reclassifying the costs to the Interfund Services (line 3690)

## Motion B: Consider approval of allocations of funding of up to \$2,936,560 for a one year extension of current grants as listed in the staff report

#### **Allocations of Funding**

At its June 3, 2014 Commission Meeting, the Commission was presented with three options for timelines to complete strategic planning, which ranged from a 6 month process of a strategic plan review to a full strategic planning process that would last 18 months. The Commission selected an 18 month strategic planning process with the intention of extending its current allocations and Program Investment Plan for an additional year to complete the strategic planning process.

To facilitate this effort, staff recommends approval of allocations of funding for current grantee organizations for FY2015/16 as follows:

If approved, staff will work closely with grantee organizations to finalize scopes of work and budgets that are substantively similar to those that are currently held. In addition, the Commission has already allocated \$1,359,870 for FY2015/16 for Early Childhood Mental Health; \$190,000 toward Pre-Kindergarten Academies; and \$100,000 toward strategic planning and Collective Impact efforts.

#### **Conclusion/Next Steps**

The First 5 Solano FY2015/16 Proposed Budget extends the 2012-2015 Program Investment Plan by one year, and includes a Discretionary Fund that provides for flexibility to deal with fiscal, policy, programmatic and organizational needs. The Proposed Budget of \$6,814,382 in expenditures and \$4,204,546 in revenues will require the use of \$2,609,836 from the Commission's fund balance. With a projected annual 5% unexpended funds being returned to the long term financial plan, the projected fund balance at the end of FY2015/16 will be \$5,744,324.

  - 3. Up to \$10,000 for 1 Pre-Kindergarten Academy session to River Delta Unified School District
  - 4. Up to \$39,948 for 4 Pre-Kindergarten Academy sessions to Travis Unified School District
  - 5. Up to \$20,000 for 2 Pre-Kindergarten Academy sessions to Vacaville Unified School District
  - 6. Up to \$10,000 for 1 Pre-Kindergarten Academy session to Circle of Friends Child Development Center (Fairfield)
  - 7. Up to \$10,000 for 1 Pre-Kindergarten Academy session to World Changers Academy-Miracle Christian Worship Center (Dixon)
- B. Consider approval of a sole source award of funding of up to \$50,000 to Vallejo City Unified School District for 5 Pre-Kindergarten Academy sessions

  (Motions A & B Source of funding: \$190,000 Per-Kindergarten Academy Allocation)
- C. Consider approval of additional award of funding of up to \$49,860 to Fairfield Suisun Unified School District for 5 additional Pre-Kindergarten Academy sessions (Motion C Source of funding: FY2014/15 Discretionary Fund)

#### **Summary/Discussion:**

The Commission's 2012-2015 Program Investment Plan allocated \$80,000 toward Pre-Kindergarten Academies. At the January 13, 2015 Commission Meeting the Commission allocated an additional \$110,000 for 2015 Pre-Kindergarten Academies for a total of \$190,000 for this effort. Request for Applications (RFA) #2015-01 was released January 15, 2015 with applications due February 18, 2015.

There were eight initial applicants requesting a total of \$209,668 in response to RFA #2015-01 for 2015 Pre-Kindergarten Academy Services. The applicants represented all cities in the County except Vallejo. A ninth application was received from Vallejo after the deadline for applications closed.

The applications included a variety of types of programs (school districts and child care centers) and many of the proposals included in-kind services that increase the value and quality of services beyond the funds requested from First 5 Solano.

Overall, complete applications were on target to provide services that are in line with the curriculums of the applicable school districts, met outreach and parental engagement targets and included enrichment activities to enhance the children's pre-kindergarten experience. In addition, applicants that proposed starting their Pre-K Academy sessions early in the summer included plans to encourage and support parents in continuing skill building activities through the summer.

#### **Options and Review Panel Recommendations:**

A Review Panel consisting of First 5 Solano staff, as well as early learning experts from within and outside the county, read and assigned preliminary scores to all the applications. The Review Panel met via teleconference to finalize their scores and rankings. Based on the funding available, the Review Panel developed three recommendations for the Commission's consideration (See also table below):

- 1. The first recommendation funds six of the eight initial applicants at the amounts they requested. In addition, the recommendation includes funding the seventh applicant, Fairfield Suisun Unified School District, for 4 out of the 10 requested sessions. The last applicant was not recommended for funding.
- 2. The second recommendation is to provide a sole source contract to Vallejo City Unified School District whose application came in after the RFA had closed. While the application could not be considered during the normal review panel process as part of RFA #2015-01, VCUSD expressed interest and has a program plan to provide 5 sessions in one of the neediest areas of the county.
- 3. The final recommendation is to further fund Fairfield Suisun Unified School District for up to 5 additional sessions by accessing \$49,860 out of the FY2014/15 Discretionary Fund. This brings the total number of sessions for FSUSD to 9 out of the 10 requested.

In addition to the funding recommendations, the Review Panel expressed concern with several of the candidates related to the extensive academic curriculum proposed. They recommend that staff orientations for funded partners include information regarding early childhood development of for preschool aged children, and that Pre-K Academies activities include both academic and social emotional development activities.

#### **Next Steps:**

Once the Commission makes a determination of the proposed recommendations and approves awards of funding, the next steps include:

- Contract development and negotiations
- Finalization of budgets, scopes of work and evaluation plans
- Submission of all required documentation, such as proof of insurance
- Approval of County Counsel
- Approval of Contracts by the County Administrator or Board of Supervisors<sup>1</sup>

These activities will take place over the next two months and will be approved on a flow basis in order for grantees to begin outreach activities.

Note: All awardees will be notified that the award of funds by the Commission does not constitute approval to move forward with their Proposals and that contracts for services must be successfully negotiated and executed before work can begin. Furthermore, no funds may be expended prior to the execution of contracts approved by County Counsel and the County Administrator.

The funds would cover registration fees for two employees to attend the 2015 Child Health, Education, and Care Summit, which aligns with First 5 Solano's overall mission. B. Ms. Gonsalves presented the Co-Sponsorship request from Solano County Women, Infants, and Children (WIC). The request is for up to \$3,000 to sponsor new and refresher Lactation Educator Counselor training and will include the latest information and techniques for lactation specialists. First 5 Solano has funded this request in the past- most recently in 2014 for 28 new staff of WIC and other local lactation specialists. Commissioner Speck asked if this training was required for staff at WIC. Ms. Perry answered that it is not required, but is extremely helpful and management observes positive differences, such as comfort level and skill in supporting lactating mothers, in staff who have taken the training. The last training for all WIC staff was approximately five years ago. Commissioner Crutison asked how WIC plans to sustain staff education without this training. Ms. Perry said they currently hold monthly refreshers/meetings to keep their staff current and they would like to attend this or similar training every 5-6 years.

A. Review Mission, Vision, & Value Statements

Ms. Allio presented the activity that will take place at the March 2015 Commission Meeting regarding reviewing the current mission, vision, and value statements of First 5 Solano and asked the Commissioners if there are any changes or additions they would like to make.

Commissioner Barbosa asked Ms. Allio her opinion as to whether the statements accurately reflect First 5 Solano? Ms. Allio responded that the current statements were carefully thought out and may not need many modifications, however, it will be up to the Commission to decide if they reflect First 5 Solano's current work. Ms. Harris added that the important factor to remember is that Commission has changed since the implementation of these statements and perhaps there is a new mission to consider. Ms. Harris also asked that the Commissioners to also contemplate whether the core values are still relevant and/or complete.

#### B. SWOC Analysis

Ms. Allio presented the graphic template which was used to collect input from different stakeholders on Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Challenges. There are a small number of stakeholder interviews left. Once the interviews are complete, the information will be brought back to the Commission to review.

#### V. Receive a Staffing and Finance Update

Ms. Richards reported that First 5 Solano is fully staffed. The mid-year budget projections have been submitted to the County Administrator's Office, and there is a projected 3% decrease in overall expenses dues to various savings in salary, legal fees, and other small contract savings. Ms. Richards has begun preparing the FY2015/16 budget through the County budgeting process and will be brining that to full Commission in March along with the allocations for the one year contract extensions.

#### VI. Receive a First 5 Futures Update

Ms. Gonsalves presented part 1 of a 3 part review of the First 5 Futures Implementation and Fund Development Plan which looked at Business Engagement. Ms. Gonsalves recommended amending the original strategy to include First 5 Solano serving as a broker to leverage funds from corporate and business partners. Ms. Harris added that an important element to this strategy is not competing for funds with community partners, but if businesses did want to donate directly to First 5 Solano we would still accept the donation.

Commissioner Barbosa questioned the ability to sustain funding through this model, especially since building relationships take staff time and resources. Ms. Gonsalves said she would explore more options, including engaging larger businesses. Moving forward, First 5 Solano will use resources more effectively including using Help Me Grow as a streamlined approach to outreach. Commissioner Barbosa commented that she believes First 5 Solano's message is not very clear to the community and perhaps the Commission should work to narrow efforts. First 5 Solano should also focus on branding. Staff responded that this is being looked at through a revised Communications Plan that will be brought to Program and Community Engagement Committee next month.

# III. Receive a report and presentation from the Center for Youth Wellness: Findings on Adverse Childhood Experiences

Mr. Betz presented data reported by the Center for Youth Wellness in California entitled, "A Hidden Crisis: Findings on Adverse Childhood Experiences in California". The report highlighted the consequences of adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) on individuals, families, and communities and aims to develop a comprehensive community approach to address ACEs among California youth. Mr. Betz reported there are 10 recognized ACEs which are categorized by (1) abuse, (2) neglect, and (3) household dysfunction. Currently, the City of Vallejo screens all school aged children against the 10 ACEs and all school teachers are informed and trained to identify behaviors in children caused by ACEs.

Commissioner Hannigan asked how the impact of addressing ACEs in schools can be sustained in the home life. Mr. Betz responded that overcoming and preventing ACEs requires a community approach in which parents are also educated on what it means to live a "trauma informed life". Mr. Betz pointed out that First 5 Solano has a unique window of opportunity to detect children affected by ACEs and begin addressing the impacts.

Commissioners Niedziela and Hannigan, and Ms. Harris invited Mr. Betz to present this information at the March 3, 2015 Commission Meeting.

#### IV. FY2014/15 Mid-Year Performance Report

Ms. Richards reported that program grantees are overall meeting 80% of performance measures. Some unmet performance measures are due to annual reporting requirements; for example CARES participants will not receive a certificate or report the completion of a course until the end of the year. Other unmet performance measures are attributed to changes in scopes of work, staffing changes, and new contracts that began on September 1, 2014 (PEAK, Aldea, and Child Haven).

Commissioner Hannigan asked for clarification on the expectation of grantees meeting performance measures mid-year. Ms. Richards explained that generally the expectation for grantees is to meet at least half of the required performance measures by mid-year, unless the measure is reported annually. Any grantees that do not meet this expectation are further analyzed to determine the reason for the disparity. Currently, First 5 Solano expects all grantees to meet their performance measures in full by the end of the fiscal year.

Ms. Harris pointed out that second quarter data for The Heather House is missing and introduced Ms. Minor to clarify the circumstances. Ms. Minor explained that much The Heather House staff time is devoted to the current audit. Ms. Minor is also new to Heather House and is researching previous reporting practices of Heather House in order to provide First 5 Solano with the most accurate account of their performance measures.

#### V. Compliance in Contracts Reports

Ms. Shipman stated that BabyFirst Solano continues to make progress in meeting their performance measures and meets regularly with First 5 Solano staff. BabyFirst Solano has met 35 of 37, or 95%, of their overall performance measures at the end of the second quarter. First 5 Solano fully anticipates that all performance measure will be on target to be met by the end of the third quarter.

#### VI. Community Engagement Activity Update

Ms. Hunt reported that staff is working on updating the First 5 Solano Communications Plan which will help staff and Commissioners provide information to the community. The draft plan will be brought back to this committee in March.

First 5 Solano is also working on Event Collaboration with Help Me Grow Solano to streamline and maximize resources at community events. The goal is to utilize resources in a way that encourages effective participation and reduces duplication of outreach activities.

#### VII. Future Agenda Items, Meeting Time/Date/Location

The Program and Community Engagement Committee is scheduled to meet next on Thursday, February March 5, 2015, 2:00 PM, at 601 Texas Street, Suite 210, Fairfield, CA. Future agenda items include: Compliance in Contracts Report, Community Engagement Activities, Communications Strategy and Action Plan.



SUBJ: Executive Director's Report for March 2015

#### **Information Items:**

Early Learning Water Cooler Conference: Several First 5 Solano staff are planning on attending the Early Learning Water Cooler conference March 23-24. The Water Cooler Conference improves and expands early care and education for California's children by bringing together diverse stakeholders to build consensus for policy solutions that support the needs of children from birth to five. Their annual conference draws more than 500 education advocates that work collaboratively to elevate the needs of California's youngest children to the forefront of policy decisions.

This year, the keynote speaker is Nobel laureate, Professor James Heckman, well known for the Heckman curve. His groundbreaking work with a consortium of economists. developmental psychologists. sociologists, statisticians and neuroscientists has shown that quality early childhood development heavily influences health. economic and social outcomes for individuals and society at large. Professor Heckman's work has been widely described as providing some of the most impactful policy arguments for why local, state, and national leaders must prioritize and invest in early learning.



**Legislative Update:** Two legislative inquiries have been responded to in the last 2 months. They are as follows:

- 1. Quality Child Care Legislative Submittal The Board of Supervisors endorsed the support of efforts around legislation to support and improve quality child care in Solano. During Solano County's regular legislative conversations in Sacramento, Assemblymember Bonilla's staff asked for additional information regarding the quality child care problem statement and proposed solution. Staff provided additional information to Bonilla's office and regarding this issue and will report back should there be further action related to this effort.
- 2. Kindergarten Readiness Assessment Legislative Discussion As a result of the Safety Net Summit on Poverty, Assemblymember Dodd's staff person inquired about consistency with statewide Kindergarten Readiness Assessments. First 5 Solano staff as well as the Executive Director of the First 5 Association had an initial fact-finding meeting with Assm. Dodd's staff person to provide additional information on this issue. Subsequently, First 5 Sonoma will be meeting with Dodd's office to continue discussions on this issue.

**2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Children and Families Policy Forum:** The second-annual Children and Families Policy Forum was held on Saturday, February 21st. The program included two keynotes: Jennifer Primous and Ayesha Sultan who presented different views on why it is important to have youth at the table and to advocate for children. The program continued with four panel presentations focusing on the topics of child and youth safety, homeless youth, children's mental and behavioral health, and quality early care and education. For each focus area, two or three individuals shared their personal stories with the audience and legislators. The legislative panel was onstage to respond to these first-hand accounts, with the panel comprised of: Superintendent of Solano Schools Jay Speck; Senator Lois Wolk; Supervisors Linda Seifert and Jim Spering; Assemblymember Bill Dodd; and Chief Deputy District Attorney Sharon Henry. After each topic, legislators responded and prompted thought-provoking ideas and next steps.

CSDA/CWDA Policy Symposium: Megan Richards and I are scheduled to attend the 2015 CSDA/CWDA Policy Symposium on March 4, 2015. The Policy Symposium will feature dynamic topics presented by local, state and national leading child advocates representing a broad field of professions. Program topics include: Child Well-Being: A Perspective from State and Local Leaders, Obstacles and Opportunities: the Road Ahead, Increasing Parental Engagement: Creating Meaningful Outcomes, New Horizons: Leveraging New Opportunities, and Moving the Agenda Forward: A Time for Action and Results. We look forward to reporting back on this exciting event.

Women's Policy Summit 2015: Chris Shipman, Cherelyn Ellington and Venis Jones Boyd attend the Women's Policy Summit 2015. The Region IX Office on Women's Health (OWH) was one of the cosponsors of the Summit held at the Sacramento Convention Center. Each year more than 500 women participate in this major summit which promotes learning, coalition-building and agendasetting. This year, the focus was on quality childcare and early choices, state and local strategies for preventing violence against women and girls, a health policy fair, and Women and Girl's Health in California and Work and Families.

**Raising of America Launch:** The Screening of "The Raising of America: Early Childhood and the Future of our Nation" scheduled on January 31<sup>st</sup> was cancelled. The screening is being rescheduled for the end of April. Stay tuned for more information.

Local and Regional Anti-Poverty/Pro-Prosperity Activities Update: Solano Safety Net Summit #8 was held January 29 in Fairfield with 99 attendees. The day was co-hosted by the regional effort Rise Together Bay Area. After a moving welcome by Board of Supervisors Chair and First 5 Solano Commissioner Erin Hannigan, key note speaker Colleen Erdes of Opportunity House took the stage. Colleen began as a client of Opportunity House and later become the Executive Director. Colleen noted that while she was able to change her life through a combination of luck, determination, and hard work, others are not so lucky. Colleen now works to be the one who steers others in the right direction.

The attendees then broke up into workgroups focusing on Closing the Word Gap, Food Security, Community Schools & Youth Employment, Work for All, & Strategies for Seniors. The workgroups provided an opportunity to receive updates from the subgroup and provide community input into the work. The day ended with Rise Together's presentation on Economic Modeling and input into Rise Together's regional strategies for moving communities out of poverty. Overall, attendees responded positively and the group felt energized to continue the work. Two local articles were printed following the event (Attachment A).

**First 5 California 2015 Child Health, Education, and Care Summit:** Ciara Gonsalves, the First 5 Solano Policy and Fund Development Manager, several grantee representatives and I attended the First 5 California Child Health, Education and Care Summit in February. Debbi Davis, our Solano Help Me Grow Coordinator presented alongside Patsy Hampton, the Statewide Help Me Grow Coordinator, on efforts happening in Solano, highlighting the outstanding work being done here. The presentation

supported the growing statewide interest in moving toward the Help Me Grow model for referral to services.

#### First 5 Futures Updates

<u>Grants</u> - First 5 Solano staff have increased efforts in applying for grant funding. The following is a summary of grant activity since the last Commission meeting in January:

- 1. Kaiser Community Benefit Letter of Intent Update: Since applying, First 5 Solano was notified by Kaiser Permanente of their decision not to invite First 5 Solano forward to provide a full proposal to the Community Benefit Grant Making Program. Over 70 letters of intent were received this year by the Kaiser Permanente Napa-Solano Region for the Community Benefit Program, making the process highly competitive. Children's Nurturing Project was invited to submit a full proposal. First 5 Solano staff worked with Children's Nurturing Project, providing technical support in developing their application. CNP is still in the running to receive the \$25,000 they requested.
- 2. **50 Fund 'Game Changer' Grant:** Many Commissioners approached staff with the exciting 'Game Changer' grant opportunity provided by the 50 Fund. The 50 Fund is a group of funders who combined their funds in honor of Super Bowl 50 coming to Santa Clara in 2016. Five grants of \$500,000 will be awarded to non-profit agencies that provide direct service to children, youth, and young adults. Funds are limited to nine bay area counties. One First 5 Solano grantee ultimately applied for the \$500,000 Children's Nurturing Project asking for funds to purchase a facility in the City of Vallejo to expand services into the Vallejo community. Staff will keep Commission apprised of the process and any communications. Grant decisions will be announced any day.
- 3. Rathmann Innovations in Education Challenge: First 5 Solano staff submitted a grant application for up to \$300,000 to The Rathmann Challenge. The challenge focused on "Provisions for Personal Necessities in Preparation for Learning" with \$100,000 available for past outstanding work and an opportunity to apply for an additional \$200,000 in support of an Even Bigger Idea. The Rathmann Challenge was seeking ideas on how to assist educators in addressing issues which interfere with PreK-12 students' abilities to be fully present in the classroom. Examples include: food, clothing, classroom supplies, shelter, personal care, dental, medical, mental health and legal support.

The \$100,000 proposal was to conduct a Kindergarten Readiness Assessment for every entering kindergarten student in Fairfield. The *Even Bigger Idea* was to expand the Kindergarten Readiness Assessment county-wide, and offer linkage and referral to students who are identified as needing additional services from the assessment. Applicants will be notified by March 3, 2015 whether or not they are selected to move forward in the process, with the top 10 moving forward in the challenge.

4. The Rita and Alex Hillman Foundation: A funding opportunity is available for a total of \$600,000 over January 1, 2016 – December 31, 2018 by the Rita and Alex Hillman Foundation. The funding opportunity calls for proposals focused on community, nurse-driven models in the areas of Maternal and Child Health, Care of the Older Adult, and Chronic Illness Management. First 5 Solano and Solano County Maternal, Child, and Adolescent Health (MCAH) are working on developing a proposal fit to the request of the funder – in this case, Nurse Family Partnership and vulnerable populations. The first step in the process is the submittal of a letter of intent by March 13, 2015. Finalists will be notified by May 4, 2015 for full proposals if selected.

# Solano team aims to slay poverty collaboratively

What does poverty look like? You and me.

What's the best way to address it? Aggressively and collaboratively, involving as many sectors of the community as possible.

So said the dozens gathered Thursday at the Solano County Events Center to brainstorm action plans during the latest poverty summit, sponsored by the Solano Safety Net Summit Steering Committee and Rise Together Bay Area.

Poverty, they said, doesn't discriminate based on age or ethnicity or background.

"I've found that poverty isn't about the person. It's generally about the circumstances," explained Joanie Erickson with the Solano Coalition for Better Health.

Clustered in working groups featuring myriad different but related issues, attendees worked to make headway on reducing poverty levels not only in Solano County but throughout the Bay Area.

Keynote speaker Colleen Erdes of Vacaville spoke about her journey from an upper crust background to living in a homeless shelter to becoming CEO of that shelter.

Back in Minnesota, Erdes had been raised in a loving home by parents with substance abuse issues. She strove to educate herself on the matter and determine why she was different.

"I grew up with a dad I adored but a father I didn't know," she recalled.

Life was fine until her daughter left for college. The successful administrator subsequently followed her boyfriend to Solano, fell into a funk and landed in the county jail, where she spent 52 days.

"I found myself not just broke but also broken," she shared.

She found aid from the probation department, was supported by her employer and had found shelter at Opportunity House, Vacaville's lone homeless shelter. The judge on her case gave her the thumbs-up, as well.

"Hillary Clinton says it correctly, it takes a village. It was a collaboration," she said, of her rehabilitation. "If my probation officer didn't know about Opportunity House, ... if there hadn't been an opening and bed space, I don't know what would have happened."

So many people feel hopeless and helpless and don't know where to go, Erdes continued. "I had nowhere and no one."

Following her release from jail, her car was repossessed. She had no money and just the clothes on her back.

"I found it an opportunity to make something better, to make myself better," she said.

The folks at Opportunity House helped her turn her life around with classes and more. Today, with Erdes at the helm, it does the same for others. Her goal, she said, is to lift up as many clients as possible.

"If we don't speak up and we don't make change ... to effect change, we're just living life," she said.

#### Solano summit focuses on ways to end poverty

About 100 representatives of various groups and agencies turned out Thursday for the Solano Safety Net Summit No. 8 to focus on ways to end poverty in Solano County and throughout the Bay Area.

A major theme of the summit was the collective impact approach used by both the Solano Safety Net Summit Steering Committee and Rise Together Bay Area, which joined to co-host the event at the county's events center building in Fairfield.

"We try to develop some goals that everyone can share," said consultant Lori Allio, who along with Kari Rader presented background information about the summit during the morning session.

"The idea is by achieving these goals we reduce poverty," said Rader, a member of the steering committee.

A portion of the summit was spent with participants divided into small groups, giving work groups a chance to reconnect.

"It's been a while since we connected with our partners," said Christina Arrostuto, executive director of Rise Together Bay Area. "So one of the things we're doing is reconnecting. We know there's a lot of great work going on at the local level. Part of our goal is to hear from people and what they're doing. Their strategies for fighting poverty is part of what's going on today.

"We have two goals," said Arrostuto, who was born and raised in Vallejo and formerly served as the executive director of First 5 Solano. "One is to put a regional overlay to what everyone is doing at the local level. Because we believe the Bay Area is one economy, we think from an advocacy point of view that when we stick together with one voice we're very powerful in the Bay Area. So there's some advantages to having a regional perspective."

"At the same time, our goal is to support and align with the capacity in each county to do this work," she said. "Because all the work to really cut poverty is going to get done at the ground level. Rise Together is not a program; it's a framework. Collective action is an approach. The work gets done by the people like those in this room."

Arrostuto presented information through a series of maps during the summit's afternoon session and was looking for input to take away.

"We're working toward a big report that's coming out in April," she said. "So today we're bringing a snapshot of our research to tell people what's going on and get their initial reaction to our work."

Thursday's summit is the first of a series meetings that Rise Together Bay Area plans to convene with nine counties in the region, Arrostuto said.

A future plan for Solano County, meanwhile, includes getting those living in poverty more involved in the effort, said Megan Richards, deputy director of First 5 Solano.

"One of our next steps is to empower those living in poverty to help us understand their story," she said. "We want to assist them in having a voice at the table."

Colleen Erdes, executive director of Vacaville's Opportunity House, was the keynote speaker at Thursday's summit. Erdes, who initially came to Opportunity House as a client, spoke of her journey to turn her life around after landing in jail.

"I'm one of those people that got released from county at 11 o'clock at night," Erdes said. "I was given until 1 o'clock the next afternoon to see if I could get into Opportunity House.

"If my probation officer hadn't known about Opportunity House, if that hadn't happened, if there wouldn't have been a bed there, if I wouldn't have been able to go back to that courtroom and say I'm employed and at Opportunity House, I don't know what would have happened," Erdes said.

Erdes went on to became manager of the Opportunity House thrift store and later was named executive director.

Since its inception in April 2010, the Solano Safety Net Summits on Poverty, which include a variety of organizations, government leaders and other community partners, have been working on ways to address poverty issues in the county. The group is funded by grants from Rise Together Bay Area, Kaiser Permanente and First 5 Solano, along with in-kind support from participating agencies.
