What and when is Passover?

Passover commemorates the biblical story of the Exodus. Passover 2024 begins on April 22, 2024, and ends on April 30, 2024. The date of Passover changes each year because the date is set not by the Gregorian calendar, but by the lunar-based Hebrew calendar. It always occurs during the Hebrew month of Nisan. On these seven (or eight) days, all leaven, whether in bread or other mixture, is prohibited, and only unleavened bread, called matzo, may be eaten. The matzo symbolizes both the Hebrews' suffering while in bondage and the haste with which they left Egypt during the Exodus. Passover is also sometimes called the Festival of Unleavened Bread.

What is Seder?

The ritual meal held to commence the Jewish festival of Passover. Passover is often celebrated with great pomp and ceremony, especially on the first night, when a special family meal called the seder is held. At the seder, foods of symbolic significance commemorating the Hebrews' liberation are eaten, and prayers and traditional recitations are performed. Though the festival of Passover is meant to be one of great rejoicing, strict dietary laws must be observed, and special prohibitions restrict work at the beginning and end of the celebration.

Traffic Advisory



Caltrans is scheduled to alternately close eastbound and westbound State Route 37 (SR-37) on four consecutive weekends starting the weekend of **Friday, April 19**. Caltrans pushed back the start of this work due to recent rains.

During the 55-hour weekend full highway closures, Caltrans will perform major pavement repair work on eastbound and westbound SR-37 between Solano and Sonoma counties. One traffic direction on SR-37 will be worked on at a time. Detours will be in effect. All work is weather dependent.

Weekend closure on WB SR-37 is scheduled on the weekend of **April 19 & April 26.** WB SR-37 will be closed and traffic detoured beginning at the WB SR-37 Connector Off-ramp to SR-29 in Vallejo.

Closures will start Friday April 19 at 9 p.m. and conclude on the following Monday, April 22 at 4 a.m.

The following weekend, closures will start Friday, April 26 at 9 p.m. and conclude the following Monday, April 29 at 4 a.m.

WB SR-37 DETOUR:

Motorists traveling westbound on SR-37 will need to exit right onto northbound SR-29 (Sonoma Blvd) in Vallejo and continue on NB SR-29 (Broadway) in American Canyon to SR-29/SR-12; then turn left and continue on SR-12/SR-121 (Carneros Hwy/Fremont Dr);

turn left on SR-121 (Arnold Drive) and make a right back onto WB SR-37.

EB SR-37 DETOUR:



Weekend closures on eastbound (EB) SR-37 is scheduled on the weekend of **May 3 & May 10.** EB SR-37 will be closed and traffic detoured beginning at the NB SR-121 (Sears Point) in Sonoma.

Closures will start Friday, May 3 at 9 p.m. and conclude on the following Monday, May 6 at 5 a.m.

The following weekend, closures will start Friday, May 10 at 9 p.m. and conclude on the following Monday, May 13 at 5 a.m.

Motorists traveling eastbound on SR-37 will need to exit left onto northbound SR-121 in Sonoma; Make a right on SR-12/SR-121(Carneros Hwy) and continue; Right on SR-12/SR-29; Enter left for the connector loop Off-ramp back to EB SR-37.

Please note that all work is weather dependent. The weekends of May 3 and May 10 are scheduled as contingency if any scheduled work is delayed or postponed.

Join Insurance Commissioner Ricardo Lara for Health 4 All Week



Insurance Commissioner Ricardo Lara will join community health leaders across the state during the first Health for All week of education and outreach. With Governor Newsom's signing of the 2023 budget, all Californians are now eligible for full-scope Medi-Cal coverage regardless of their immigration status. People attending Health for All Week events at seven cities will be able to sign up for Medi-Cal on-site and learn about other resources available at the more than 1,270 not-for-profit community health centers represented by the California Primary Care Association.

California has achieved the lowest uninsured rate ever, yet Asian, Black, and Latino Californians are two to three times more likely to be uninsured, according to the California Health Care Foundation. Commissioner Lara authored the first Health for All Kids law as a state senator in 2015 covering all children, and the Legislature and Governor have since passed laws expanding Health for All to adults.

A woman in Sacramento developed severe lead poisoning and died after using the ointment. If you have used this ointment, contact your health care provider immediately to get your blood tested for lead.

Help Inform MTC's 2024 Equity Priority Communities Update



The Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) is updating the Bay Area's designated Equity Priority Communities and invites feedback on the proposed changes by May 15.

(MTC) and the Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) have developed a draft update to the geographies of the region's <u>Equity Priority Communities</u> (EPCs), which help inform long-range planning efforts such as <u>Plan Bay Area 2050+</u>, as well as funding and public engagement priorities.

While the methodology remains consistent with past updates, proposed changes to Bay Area EPCs include census tracts and updated thresholds of demographic variables based on the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) data (2018-2022).

MTC and ABAG invite your feedback on the <u>Draft 2024 EPC</u> update, which includes:


- A <u>technical memo</u> detailing the proposed changes;
- An <u>interactive map</u> visualizing the proposed EPCs using the latest census tract geographies; and
- Comparison maps showing the changes in EPCs since the last update.

Those wishing to give feedback on the proposed changes to designated Bay Area EPCs are encouraged to do so by filling out the comment form on the MTC website: www.mtc.ca.gov/2024EPC. Comments also may be submitted via email to info@planbayarea.org using the subject line "EPC Update."

Following the comment period, staff will review and leverage the feedback received to inform the Final 2024 EPC Update. The update will then be incorporated into the Plan Bay Area 2050+ Final Blueprint, currently slated for adoption in fall 2024, and will be used in the Plan Bay Area 2050+ Equity Analysis Report in 2025, among other important deliverables.

National Crime Victims' Rights Week



The Solano County District Attorney's Office in partnership with Fairfield and Vacaville Police departments will hold a moment of reflection honoring National Crime Victims' Rights Week. This year's theme is a call to action for us all to create a safe environment for crime victims to share what happened to them.

We often talk about defendants' rights in the criminal justice system, and we work to ensure these rights are always upheld, however, often lost in these conversations are crime victims - those who have been victimized at the hands of another.

SolTrans is going paperless



SolTrans is going paperless and eliminating all paper fare passes effective July 1, 2024. SolTrans already has several digital fare payment options available like <u>Token Transit</u>, <u>Clipper Card</u> (cash value and passes), and <u>Clipper START</u>. Exact cash and coins will continue to be accepted to purchase one-way fares and day passes on all local and express services.

SolTrans is also looking into Open Loop Payment readers, which will allow riders to pay with their debit, credit cards, or digital wallets

The Solano County Farm Bureau is administering the State Water Efficiency and Enhancement Program (SWEEP), which provides financial assistance to farmers and ranchers in the form of grants to implement irrigation systems that reduce greenhouse gases

and save water on California agricultural operations.

Applications from Alameda, Contra Costa, Sacramento, Solano, San Joaquin, San Mateo, Santa Clara and Yolo County will be accepted with priority to those qualifying as socially disadvantaged farmers and ranchers. CDFA's definition for SDFR is: "Socially Disadvantaged Farmer or Rancher" means a farmer or rancher who is a member of a socially disadvantaged group.

Eligible system components include (but not limited too):

^{*}soil moisture monitoring

^{*}drip systems

^{*}switching to low-pressure irrigation systems

^{*}pump retrofits

*variable frequency drives, and

*installation of renewable energy to reduce on-farm water use and energy.

Solano Senior Fraud Prevention Center



Solano Public Health's Older and Disabled Adult Services (ODAS) Bureau is proud to announce the launch of their new website, www.SolanoScamCenter.org which houses the Solano Senior Fraud Prevention Center, to address financial abuse among seniors. Due to a significant portion of clients

reporting financial abuse last year (about one-third of clients which totaled close to 750 individuals), ODAS began the Financial Abuse Media Campaign.

This campaign focused on financial abuse prevention among the senior population. Nationally, seniors lose more than \$3 billion each year, or an average of \$34,200 per victim. Unfortunately, this type of abuse is under-reported, so the loss is likely greater.

Hopefully, through the Solano Senior Fraud Prevention Center, seniors and others will be educated so that they will not become a victim. The new website Solano Senior Fraud Prevention Center is on the Network of Care

Solano College students get vouchers instead of fines



The Solano Community College
Department of Public Safety recently
rolled out a Fix-a-Falcon Bulb
Replacement Program in collaboration
with the college's automotive training
center and local repair shops to
provide repair vouchers to students
who are stopped for an equipment
violation instead of fixing citations on
campus or off campus.

SCCDPS understand that students already have a lot on their plates and they don't want to add to their burdens. Receiving a fixing ticket could entail taking time out of their busy school schedules to purchase a replacement item, and if they're unable to make the change themselves, they may need to visit a repair shop, locate an officer to sign off on the ticket, and pay court processing fees.

This process can be costly and time-consuming for the students. These vouchers address issues such as malfunctioning bulbs on their vehicles, thereby enhancing safety while mitigating financial burdens, especially for economically disadvantaged students.

To be eligible for this program, you must be currently enrolled as a student at SCC. The voucher can be issued to SCC students during a traffic stop or casual encounters on campus. Additionally, SCC students who receive bulb-related citations from other law enforcement agencies off campus are also eligible, provided they are currently enrolled at SCC. With the voucher, students can arrange for a free replacement of the faulty item by contacting DPS. This program benefits everyone involved and contributes to safer roads.

Solano College Theatre (SCT) is pleased to announce its spring musical Anything Goes directed by SCT's Artistic Director Christine Mani.






The compost will be delivered in bulk and residents should bring their own containers/ bags to fill up and take home. Residents can take as much compost as they want while supplies last. This is a self-serve event, but shovels and gloves will be provided for use.

The compost is from Northern Compost (Yolo County) and is listed by the Organic Materials Review Institute (OMRI) for use in organic production, approved as an Organic Input Fertilizing Material by the California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA), and is certified with the United States Composting Council's Seal of Testing Assurance. The compost is made from recycled green material, food waste, and woody material collected from residential organic carts.

From 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., on Saturday, April 27 in coordination with the Drug Enforcement Agency, the Fairfield Police Department will host DEA's National Prescription Drug Take Back Day at 1000 Webster Street. They will collect tablets, capsules, patches, and other solid forms of prescription drugs.

For more than a decade, the event has helped Americans easily rid their homes of unneeded medications—those

that are old, unwanted, or expired—that too often become a gateway to addiction. In partnership with local law enforcement, Take Back Day has removed 8,950 tons of medication from circulation since its inception.

Collection sites will not accept syringes, sharps, and illicit drugs. Liquid products, such as cough syrup, should remain sealed in their original container. The cap must be tightly sealed to prevent leakage. Take Back Day offers free and anonymous disposal of unneeded medications at close to 5,000 local drop-off locations nationwide.

Saturday, **April 13**, I attended the author event held at the Benicia Library. The author was Joanna Ho and she highlighted her book ON THE TIP OF A WAVE. The story exposes Ai Weiwei's journey as he built an exhibit which showcases the life jackets left on the Greek Island of Lesbos. His creation was the thousands of life jackets shown at the Konzerthaus Berlin. Ms. Ho created the words to remind us to Remember Humanity. All of us want to raise our families in a safe environment, with food, and shelter.

Sunday, April 14, I attended the poet readings at the Benicia Library. April is National Poetry Month. The title of the event was "Our Best to You." I enjoyed listening to everyone. It takes a lot of courage to stand in front of friends and strangers to read your own words.

Monday, April 15, I went to Sulphur Spring Creek with the Benicia High School AP class. The Solano Resource Conservation District (SRCD) sponsors these field trips. The students are gathering data to see if our creeks are healthy. It is called Biomonitoring. Students have a science teacher come to their school and introduce the program. Each student receives and book and, in the classroom, learn about watershed and steam ecology. In the field, students collect the water and look at what animals can be seen by the naked eye. Data is collected. There is a professor in Oregon who has been keeping track of the information at the creeks that the students have been investigating over the last 10 plus years. Then I went to Lake Herman to see 5th grade class from Mary Farmar. The picture of the Barn Owls was taken at the Lake. (They are so cute)

This program is important. If we want our students to know why saving the environment is important, they must be exposed to it. This program pays for the materials, the bus, and the teachers that are in the field and visit the classroom. Thank you, Ms. Butler for letting me know when my schools are involved.
