PURPOSE STATEMENT - Community Correction Partnership

The mission of the Community Corrections Partnership (CCP) is to discuss issues related to the implementation of various pieces of state legislation that focus on adult criminal offenders, including the realignment of many state public safety functions to local jurisdictions. The overall objective is to reduce the recidivism rate of adult offenders in the local criminal justice system.

Membership of the CCP is defined by the Community Corrections Performance Incentive Act of 2009 (SB 678) and includes the Chief Probation Officer (Chair)*, Presiding Judge of the Superior Court*, a County Supervisor or County Administrator, District Attorney*, Public Defender*, Sheriff*, the head of the Department of Social Services*, the head of the County Department of Mental Health, the head of the County Department of Employment, the head of the County Alcohol and Substance Abuse programs, the County Superintendent of Education, a local chief of police*, a representative of a community-based organization with experience in successfully providing rehabilitative services to persons convicted of criminal offenses, and an individual who represents the interests of victims.

Through AB 109/AB117 the CCP is responsible for recommending a local plan to the county Board of Supervisors (BOS) for the implementation of the 2011 public safety realignment. This legislation also established an Executive Committee within the CCP, Each Executive Committee member is identified with an asterisk (*) above. The Executive Committee is responsible for approving the local plan for recommendation to the BOS.

Ordered vs. Cleared Bench Worrants















October 2011 - July 2012 Risk Level




Jail Population Trend


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




Community Corrections Partnership meeting of August 8, 2012, Item Number 9

Requested Action: Consider supporting a portion of the Supplemental Funding Request for FY2012/13 Public Safety Realignment (AB109) Budget to the Board of Supervisors for approval (Attached as Public Safety Realignment (AB109) Budget - Exhibit A)

Recommendation:

The Supplemental funding requests in the amount of \$2,857,983 are not all recommended for consideration to the Board of Supervisors at this time. \$125,000 in planning funds remains uncommitted. The following funding requests in the amount of \$961,165 are recommended for consideration: a \$474,915 request from the Sheriff's Office for the expansion of an 80-bed section in the Claybank Sentenced Detention Facility; a request of \$300,000 for Health and Social Services to provide high-cost substance abuse and mental health placements; and \$186,250 request from the Probation Department for startup cost, a research position, and a consultant related to implementing a pilot Day Reporting Center in Vallejo. Requests in the amount of \$1,771,818 from the Probation Department for operational staff and a Day Reporting Center are still pending the development of the Day Reporting Center Implementation Plan along with analysis by the County Administrator's Office and the Human Resources Department.

Background

The 2011 Public Safety Realignment Act (AB 109 and companion legislation) redirected from the State of California (State) to Counties specific duties and responsibilities associated with the sentencing and supervision of individuals convicted of felony offenses. The Public Safety Realignment Legislation changed sentencing practices, shifted responsibility for the housing of convicted non-violent offenders and parole violators to the Counties, shifted responsibility for supervising paroled non-violent, non-serious, and non-sex (non-non-non) offenders to County Probation Departments, and in 2013 will shift the responsibility for conducting parole hearings to the local courts.

The Board of Supervisors (BOS) in compliance with the new mandates approved a Public Safety Realignment Act Implementation Plan on November 1, 2011 with an initial implementation budget of \$4,362,824 for FY2011/12. As Public Safety Realignment moves in to the second year of funding, the FY2012/13 Adopted Budget includes a conservative revenue estimate of \$5.9 million to meet the ongoing needs of Public Safety Realignment (Exhibit A).

Based on Senate Bill 1020 the State of California appropriated a portion of State Sales Tax

revenue and Vehicle License Fee to fund Public Safety Realignment (AB109). Because the legislation based the allocation formula on a portion of Sales tax a fixed dollar amount is not guaranteed. The legislation states that Solano County will receive 1.0747% of the State allocation. Based on this formula, the California State Association of Counties estimates Solano County will receive \$8,449,389 in program funds and \$155,533 for District Attorney/Public Defender revocation activities (Exhibit B). Solano County was also allocated \$150,000 in planning funds to assist the Community Corrections Partnership with the continued development of the Public Safety Realignment Implementation Plan (Exhibit C). The total estimate funding amount for FY2012/13 is \$8,754,942. Funding is anticipated to be \$8,604,942 for FY2013/14 based on the current formula; however, without the additional planning funds.

The estimated increase in available funding has resulted in supplemental funding request in the amount of \$2,857,983 which is summarized in the August 2, 2012 Public Safety Realignment (AB109) Budget (Exhibit A) and are described as follows:

Sheriff's Office Supplemental Funding Request:

(\$474,915 Recommended for consideration)

The Solano County inmate population attributed to Public Safety Realignment has exceeded the Department of Finance and the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR) Realignment estimates. Based on initial estimates from the California Department of Finance (DOF), the Solano County Sheriff's Office was projected to need 331 additional beds by full rollout of Realignment in October 2015. As of July 30, 2012, only ten months into the rollout of Realignment, the Sheriff's Office is already at 105% of the Department of Finance's 4-year population impact estimate.

As of July 31, 2012, there were 348 inmates housed in the County's detention facilities as a result of 2011 Public Safety Realignment. Some are serving new sentences in the County jail; others are awaiting disposition of violations or new cases. Thirty Seven Percent of the incarcerated population at the Solano County Jail is now made up of inmates directly related to AB109 (Realignment). As a result of the unanticipated growth in the Realignment population, in recent months the Solano County jail has experienced frequent overcrowding. Custody capacity is needed to house realigned offenders in the Solano County Jail. Space needs to be available for flash incarceration, for housing of unsentenced, sentenced non-non-nons, probation revoked PRCS, and paroles. An 80-bed section in the Claybank Sentenced Detention Facility has been reopened to accommodate the housing of prisoners previously sentenced to state prison.

In anticipation of the need to open a second 80-bed module at Claybank, the Sheriff is requesting funding for 5.0 FTE additional Correctional Officers and 1.0 FTE Deputy Sheriff with basic equipment to expand the SET team. The supplemental funding requested should be considered a minimum. There is a potential that opening another 80-bed module during FY2012/13 could result in additional Realignment related impacts to non-personnel operational costs in the jails. In July 2012, the average daily population (ADP) of Solano County's jails was 910 inmates. As is true in most California jails these days, the great majority – 648 inmates (74%) – of those in Solano County's jails were unsentenced while only 246 inmates (26%) were sentenced. Of the incarcerated population, 94% have felony charges and 6% were charged with misdemeanors only.

The Sheriff's Office is also evaluating the treatment programs available in the jail, and may require additional funding to modify or implement in-custody treatment programs.

Probation Department's Supplemental Funding Request for Operations:

(\$86,250 is recommended for consideration)

As of August 2, 2012 the Probation Department is currently supervising 317 PCRS and 11 non-non-non offenders. The number of offenders continues to increase monthly for both the PCRS and non-non-non offenders. It is anticipated that the PCRS offenders will begin to level off and the non-non-non's will increase. The Probation Department utilizes a range of evidence-based strategies geared to the risk levels of those being supervised. Offenders who pose a low risk to the community may be placed on telephone reporting, while most moderate, high and very-high risk individuals are subject to frequent face-to-face contact with a probation officer trained to support and enforce compliance with offenders' case plans and terms of supervision.

As part of the supplemental funding request the Probation Department is requesting the following 4.0 FTE positions:

- 1.0 FTE Senior Deputy Probation Officer to handle the highest risk cases. The Probation Department's caseload ratio for high risk supervision of 1 officer to 50 active probationers needs to be examined based on the results of the Level of Service/ Case Management Inventory (LS/CMI) assessment tool. In reviewing the risk levels of the offenders, it became necessary to utilize Senior Deputy Probation Officers to provide supervision and serve as liaisons for Law Enforcement for the purpose of conducting compliance checks and residency verifications. Therefore, in the Adopted Budget for FY2012/13, the Department deleted 3 Deputy Probation Officer positions currently allocated to PRCS and added 3 Senior Deputy Probation Officer positions. As of July 2, 2012 there were 39 offenders classified as very high risk, 169 classified as High Risk, 51 offenders classified as medium risk, and 2 offenders classified as low risk. 85 offenders are being processed through the assessment system. Based on the anticipated assessment results, an additional Senior Deputy Probation Officer may be required to handle the highest risk cases. (This position is pending an analysis of the caseload and the organizational structure)
- 1.0 FTE Supervising Deputy Probation Officer. A Supervising Deputy Probation Officer is required to provide training, supervision, and oversight of Probation staff. The Probation Department anticipates having a staff of 11 Deputy Probation Officers and 5 Senior Deputy Probation Officers. The appropriate staffing ratio for officers to supervisor is 7 to 1. This additional position will allow for the proper supervision and oversight of staff in both Fairfield and Vallejo offices. (This position is pending a review of the organizational structure)
- 1.0 FTE Legal Procedures Clerk (Journey) the Probation Department anticipates opening the Vallejo Office on October 1, 2012. With the opening of the Vallejo office an additional Legal Procedures Clerk (LPC) is needed (presently there are 2 LPCs in Fairfield) to support the

growing workload by processing files and completing data entry in Vallejo. The Probation Department is requesting 1 additional LPC for a total of 3 LPC's. (This position is pending a review of the organizational structure)

1.0 FTE Research Position, with the actual classification to be determined through Solano County Human Resources. The position will plan, organize, conduct research and evaluation for AB109 programs and services. Determine data goals and objectives, develop strategies to achieve objectives, and design data collection procedures. Develop and implement program performance and outcome measures; determine outcomes from evaluated data; and make programming and service recommendations. Write research reports, prepare presentations and share information with other stakeholders. Lead a grant team in identifying and applying for other funding opportunities. (This position is pending a review of the classification; however, is recommended for consideration)

<u>Probation Department's Supplemental Funding Request for the Day Reporting Centers:</u> (\$75,000 Recommended for consideration)

Funds are requested to be set aside for two Day Reporting Centers; a Service/Day Reporting Center (DRC) would provide a "one-stop shop" of services for offenders. A Day Reporting Center Subcommittee of the CCP established a workgroup in April 2012 to focus solely on the best model for Solano County. The workgroup visited the Day Reporting Centers in Napa, San Joaquin, and Stanislaus Counties. Napa County has a contract with Behavioral Interventions (BI) to operate their center. The operational cost of these centers range from \$1 million to \$1.2 million. The Day Reporting Center in San Joaquin and Stanislaus County are operated by the Probation Department. The operational cost of these centers range from \$800 to \$900 thousand. Based on the review of information obtained it is suggested that the Probation Department assume oversight and administrative responsibilities for the DRC in Solano County. This model is the most cost effective and allows for the greatest flexibility to meet clients' needs. The Solano County model for the DRC will include eight core elements:

- Cognitive Behavioral groups using Evidence Based Practices such as Aggression Replacement Training, Moral Recognition, Crossroads, and/or Thinking for a Change.
- 2. Mental Health (MH)/ Substance Abuse (SA) assessments tools using Evidence Based Practices
- 3. MH/SA treatment groups using Evidence Based Practices and certified addiction counselors and peer mentors. Peer mentors are individuals who have had a successful experience in the justice system/substance abuse system and can be of assistance as a "safety net" of support to those currently navigating the reentry system.
- 4. GED / High School Diploma/ literacy services
- 5. Job readiness, vocational training and employability skills

- 6. Drug testing
- 7. Eligibility Benefits and other social services both online self-service and inperson benefit assistance
- 8. Transportation and Housing Assistance

At the July 11, 2012 CCP meeting, direction was provided to explore the creation of a Day Reporting Center in Vallejo first and then one in Fairfield. Four Operational Workgroups were established to refine the services delivery model:

- 1. Cognitive Behavioral Groups & Drug Testing: Probation
- 2. MH/Substance Abuse Assessments, Treatment and Benefit services: HS&S
- 3. GED/High School, Job Readiness and Vocational Training: WIB and Sheriff's Office
- 4. Housing: Reentry Council

A formal DRC operational budget is still in the development phase; however, based on proposals from other counties, \$1.6 to \$1.8 million is estimated for the operational cost of two DRCs. Startup cost such as the modifications or improvements to a facility could be covered from the FY2011/12 remaining fund balance. Positions' being considered for the DRC consists of a Senior Deputy Probation Officer, a Journey Level Probation Officer and a Social Worker. The intent is the Probation staff will manage the operations as well as conduct Cognitive Behavior groups. The Social Worker will coordinate with Health and Social Services (H&SS) and other agencies to assist clients obtaining services and provide limited case management.

Planning Funds

(\$25,000 Recommended for consideration)

On July 20, 2012 Solano County received notification that \$150,000 was allocated in Planning Funds to assist the Community Corrections Partnership with the continued development of the Public Safety Realignment Implementation Plan. The DRC is a large part of the CCP Implementation Plan; thus, it recommended that \$25,000 is appropriated for a consultant to provide technical expertise on the analysis and development of a DRC implementation Plan.

Health and Social Services Supplemental Funding Request:

(\$300,000 Recommended for consideration)

One of the main goals of Public Safety Realignment is the reduction of recidivism; therefore, H&SS is currently analyzing available data and best practices to develop Mental Health and Substance Abuse programs. H&SS is also collaborating with the Probation Department to develop programs for the Day Reporting Center.

H&SS is requesting that \$300,000 be set aside for high-cost substance abuse and mental health placements that occur at the recommendation of the multi-disciplinary team or as a crisis intervention. This will ensure that AB109 probationers requiring priority intensive treatment in approved treatment facilities are placed first in line for such services where appropriate and necessary to prevent recidivism.

Examples of such services are:

- 1. Crisis hospitalization due to escalating mental illness;
- 2. Residential substance abuse treatment for high risk substance abusing probationers;
- 3. Residential mental health services for the mentally ill probationer;

- 4. Evidence-based intensive services which are ultimately identified by the MH/Substance Abuse Assessments, Treatment and Benefit Services Workgroup;
- 5. Placement at Napa State Hospital;
- 6. Placement at Institutions for Mental Disease (medium-term locked facilities).

H&SS will assign a Benefit Specialist to the DRC to assist eligible individuals' access services through Medi-Cal, County Medical Services Program (CMSP), and Supplemental Security Income (SSI). This in turn may help to reduce or eliminate cost related to the above services.

Fiscal Year 2012/2013 Realignment Community Corrections Partnership Program Disbursement

Based on the Fiscal Year 2012/2013 Budget Act, AB1464, Chapter 21, the Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC) is authorized to administer \$7,900,000 in consultation with the Department of Finance (DOF), and distributed to the counties for their local Community Corrections Partnerships (CCPs), as established pursuant to subdivision (b) of Section 1230 of the Penal Code, for the purpose of assisting each county's CCP with the continued development, including any necessary adjustments, of the CCP's plan to implement AB109 (Chapter 15 of the Statutes of 2011). The funding pursuant to this provision shall be distributed to the counties based on their population as detailed: (1) \$100,000 to each county with a population of 0, to 200,000 inclusive, (2) \$150,000 to each county with a population of 200,001 to 749,999 inclusive, and (3) \$200,000 to each county with a population of 750,000 and above. Based upon the most recent county population data published by the DOF (see attachment), the State Controller's Office will issue your payment of \$150,000 under separate cover.

Each county receiving funding pursuant to this provision shall provide the BSCC a copy of the county's final plan, including revisions to their plan, within 60 days of its approval by the county. A copy of the plan should be sent to:
