#### **Juneteenth**

Juneteenth is a significant date in American history and the African American experience. The name is a play on the date of June 19<sup>th</sup>, 1856. On that day, the Union Army made its way into Galveston, TX under the leadership of General Gordon Granger, and he announced to the people of Texas that all enslaved African Americans were free.

Even though we know that the Emancipation Proclamation freed African Americans in rebelling states (Texas being one of them, from as early as when the Proclamation went into effect on January 1, 1863) and we know that the Civil War had ended in April of 1865, it took a while for freedom to make its way to the western most rebelling state. Although there were enslavers who were aware of the implementation of the Emancipation Proclamation, it wasn't until

June 19, 1865, that it was enforced with the Union Army. June 19, freed enslaved people throughout the nation.

Keep in mind, there were still border states which were still part of the Union. They had not seceded from the Union, and they still maintained slavery. Maryland, for example, was one of them. It took the creation of the Emancipation Proclamation, the end of the Civil War, and the passage of the 13th Amendment to finally end slavery throughout the nation. The Reconstruction Amendments are significant as they came into being after the end of the Civil War. They include the 13th Amendment that ended slavery; the 14th Amendment provides citizenship, due process and equal protection; and the 15th Amendment provides the opportunity to vote and hold office.



communities, history, and



PG&E crews will be resuming gas meter maintenance work on approximately 75,000 gas meters in the Sacramento Division, including parts of Colusa, Sacramento, Solano, Sutter and Yolo counties, beginning in early June. This work is expected to be completed by the end of October but may last throughout December given missed appointments and/or unforeseen delays.

During this work, PG&E crews will be replacing a device attached to gas meters, primarily at residential properties, which communicates gas usage back to PG&E's secure network. This helps to ensure that PG&E can provide accurate and timely bills. This maintenance work will take less than 30 minutes to complete and should not interrupt service.

# **CPUC Expands Existing Community Solar Programs and Launches New Community Solar Program**



The California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) has expanded and improved its existing

community solar programs and launched a new community

renewable energy program that will allow California to capture millions of dollars in state and federal funding, including the Solar For All grant recently awarded to California by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency through support of the Biden Administration.

The Decision doubles the program capacity of the Disadvantaged Community Green Tariff Program (DAC-GT), which is a community solar program that allows low-income customers living in disadvantaged communities to subscribe to a pool of solar projects and receive a guaranteed 20 percent electricity bill subsidy. This program is funded through electricity bills and cap and trade funds.

# Housing Element Program Implementation and Upcoming Meetings



Housing! It's a big topic, and one that both the State of California and City of Benicia are serious about.

You may recall that the City's certified Housing Element was shaped by the participation and voice of many Benicians. But did you know that the plan includes many tasks (programs) that the City must complete and report on

each year?

The Benicia Planning Division is hard at work addressing these programs and will explore next steps at a City Council workshop scheduled for June 25 at 6 p.m.

At the workshop, key programs will be discussed that will drive important decisions over the coming year:

- The approach to rezoning site(s) to allow for feasible development at least 75 lower income units on the west side of town, north of I-780, in support of housing mobility (Program 2.04), and
- The approach to disposition (sale) of three city-owned sites for housing development (Program 1.16).

# **Mechanical Issues Continue with Mare Island Causeway Bridge**



A press release from the city of Vallejo:

The Mare Island Causeway Bridge is still unable to raise and lower to allow boat traffic on the Napa River because of ongoing mechanical

problems. The city is working with Hardesty & Hanover, the original designers of the bridge, to speed up the necessary repairs.

Engineers from Hardesty & Hanover will be on-site on Tuesday, June 18, to help identify and fix the problem. It has been determined that the bridge's old electrical system, which uses obsolete parts, is a major cause of the failure.

To ensure a thorough repair, the City's Public Works team along with Hardesty & Hanover will also check for any mechanical and structural issues that might have contributed to the problem. One of the parts required for the repair has arrived this week and more parts will arrive early next week. Once all of the parts arrive and

the team has fully assessed the system, repairs will begin immediately.

An exact date for when the bridge will be fully operational again is unknown at this time, but the City remains committed to resolving the issue as quickly and safely as possible.

The US Coast Guard is aware that this issue is ongoing.

We understand that this situation is inconvenient for boat traffic, and we appreciate your patience as we continue to assess the bridge and await parts.

# Vallejo Fire Department urges residents to refrain from using illegal fireworks



Information from the Vallejo Fire Department:

As summer begins, the Vallejo Fire Department has already experienced an uptick in vegetation fire responses. With warming weather, the risk and severity of fires continue to increase.

The Vallejo Fire Department reminds residents that all fireworks are strictly prohibited within city limits, including the unincorporated areas. While it is widely known that illegal fireworks are inherently dangerous, they pose an even greater risk brought on by drought conditions and increasing temperatures.

The city requests that citizens report the use of illegal fireworks via <u>SeeClickFix</u>. Reports will be reviewed, and warnings or administrative citations will be issued where possible. The Fire Department will use these reports to identify high-use areas.

Firefighters and Prevention staff will patrol these areas and engage with neighbors to provide an education focused approach to reducing illegal fireworks activity leading up to the 4th of July holiday. Informational door hangers will also be distributed.

The Fire Department aims to reduce the local threat of vegetation fires by limiting those caused by illegal fireworks. This strategy relies on outreach, education, and an increased presence of firefighters.

Effective immediately, firefighters will patrol neighborhoods at various times of the day to discourage and deter illegal fireworks use. On weekends, residents may see firefighters knocking on doors and handing out educational materials to further discourage the use of illegal fireworks.

"We need to work together as a community. Reporting illegal fireworks on <u>SeeClickFix</u> allows us to better allocate our resources and focus on areas with fireworks activity," Fire Chief Drayton states. "The Fire Department will use these reports to identify highuse areas for on-duty patrols by Firefighters and Prevention staff."

# Solano County Registrar of Voters finds California Forever Initiative having sufficient signatures to certify to the County Board of Supervisors

A Solano County press release:

This week, the Solano County Registrar of Voters certified the results of the signature review for the Petition "Rezoning of 17,500 acres of Land in East Solano County to Allow the Development of a New Community" (also

known as "California Forever"), finding the petition sufficient to certify the results to the County Board of Supervisors.

Under state elections law, proponents must collect at least 13,062 valid signatures from voters registered in the county to qualify the initiative for the ballot, a figure based on 10 percent of county voters in the previous gubernatorial election. The Registrar of Voters projected that 14,832 signatures would be valid based on the review of a random sampling of signatures. Registrar of Voters staff started reviewing signatures in mid-April, hand-reviewing a total of six percent of the signatures submitted.

"Each team independently reviewed 3 percent of the signatures, which was then cross-checked and independently reviewed by a second team to provide high confidence that the results are repeatable," said Tim Flanagan, Chief Information Officer and Registrar of Voters. "The next step will be for the County Board of Supervisors to accept the results and move forward with steps to either adopt the initiative as-is, place the measure on the November 2024 ballot, or order a report to assess impacts before placing it on the ballot."

The Registrar of Voters will present the certified totals to the Board of Supervisors on June 25, 2024, at 2 p.m. The agenda for this meeting will be available on June 20, 2024, by clicking here.



FYI: SUN Bucks, also known as Summer EBT (S-EBT), is a new program to help families buy food for their school-ages children during the summer. Families will get \$120 for each eligible child to buy groceries during the summer. Families must use SUN Bucks within 122 days of funds being loaded to their card. Children who get SUN Bucks can still participate in other summer meal programs. SUN Bucks will not affect immigration status.

If your child is age 6 -18 and get CalFresh, CalWORKs or Medi-Cal: OR age 0 to 22, attending schools that are part of National School Lunch and /or School Breakfast Programs, and are approved for free or reduced -price meals. Child attending Head Start, experiencing homelessness, living in foster care or part of a migrant family are also automatically eligible.
