### Commission Supports Newsom's Proposal to Address California's Home Insurance Crisis

The Little Hoover Commission released a <u>letter</u> today in support of Governor Gavin Newsom's <u>pending legislation</u> that would streamline the review of insurance rate filings.

The <u>letter</u>, addressed to Governor Newsom and members of the California Legislature, states that the proposed legislation "would reduce uncertainty for insurers, help stabilize the market, and ultimately provide a greater chance of continued coverage for Californians seeking to insure their most valuable possession."

Earlier this year, the Commission launched a <u>study</u> assessing the problems and potential solutions for Californians struggling to protect their homes. The Commission plans to release a full report later this year evaluating the state's homeowners insurance market and making recommendations for reform. # Fairfield Forward 2050: Draft General Plan Update available for public review



The public review period for the Draft General Plan Update, Draft CAP, and DEIR ends on September 9, at 5 p.m.

Fairfield Forward 2050 consists of a General Plan Update, Climate Action Plan, and Environmental Impact Report (EIR). If adopted, the General Plan Update would guide future land use decisions in the City of Fairfield, providing a long-term vision for the future and, through its policies and implementing actions, indicating how that vision would be achieved over the next 25 years. The Climate Action Plan (CAP) would address the community's greenhouse gas emissions (GHG) and demonstrate how the City will comply with State GHG emission reduction targets.

The Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) analyzes how adopting and implementing the goals, policies, actions, and projected buildout of the Fairfield Forward 2050 project. An EIR is intended to inform decision-makers and the general public of the potential significant environmental impacts of a proposed project. The proposed project will result in unavoidable significant impacts with regards to agricultural resources, mineral resources, and transportation.


As the first draft of the Bay Area's next long-range plan, the Draft Blueprint demonstrates significant progress toward reaching key goals for housing affordability, post-pandemic economic recovery and environmental health and sustainability. The Draft Transit

2050+ Network outlines how to make trips faster and more frequent at all times of day and how to connect more communities by bus, train or ferry.

During the webinar, staff will provide an overview of the key performance and equity findings from the Draft Blueprint analysis, as well as key challenges to address as part of the forthcoming Final Blueprint process — including how to reach the Bay Area's statutorily-required per capita greenhouse gas emissions reductions target. Staff also will introduce the Draft Transit 2050+ Network and the findings from the assessment of major transportation projects. Finally, staff will provide a preview of planned public and partner engagement activities over the summer and fall, including pop-up public workshops in all nine Bay Area counties.

### **Solano Land Trust**



Letter from the Executive Director Nicole Braddock of the Solano Land Trust:

Earlier this year, the board of directors of the Solano Land Trust

voted to formally oppose the East Solano Plan/California Forever ballot initiative.

On behalf of the Solano Land Trust, and as a resident of Solano County, I welcome the recent news that the investment group has withdrawn the measure and it will not appear on the November ballot.

Since the project was announced, Solano County residents have overwhelmingly expressed concerns which remain largely unaddressed, such as the impact on our water supply, local agriculture, pollution from increased traffic, and the natural environment.

Solano County residents have also clearly and loudly spoken out against tactics that attempt to bully our farming families, devalue our agricultural industry, diminish natural resources, and mislead voters with un-enforceable "guarantees." The unprecedented media coverage of Solano County ensured our voices were heard across the nation and around the globe.

California Forever has stated that they will continue to pursue the proposed city through the traditional county process, which includes an environmental impact report and public hearing process. This process will include more public engagement and transparency and is in sharp contrast to the secretive land purchases over the last five years.

We continue to be concerned about the impacts of the proposed city, and plans for the other lands owned by California Forever which stretches from the borders of Travis Air Force Base to Rio Vista and the Sacramento River. This land is larger than the cities of Vallejo and Fairfield combined.

California Forever has stated that they will continue to pursue the proposed city through the traditional county process, which includes an environmental impact report and public hearing process. This process will include more public engagement and transparency and is in sharp contrast to the secretive land purchases over the last five years.

We continue to be concerned about the impacts of the proposed city, and plans for the other lands owned by California Forever which stretches from the borders of Travis Air Force Base to Rio Vista and the Sacramento River. This land is larger than the cities of Vallejo and Fairfield combined.

The work to protect this land is far from over.

Solano Land Trust will continue our tireless work of protecting land for people, for food and the natural environment, and inspiring a love of the land for future generations. We will continue to partner with our community to protect our natural resources like clean air, water, habitat, open spaces, and agricultural lands that make Solano County special and a great place to live and work.

As your local land trust, we commit to staying highly engaged in with Solano County in our collective plans for the future of this place we call home. We owe it to our community, and to the lands that connect us all.

# Public Health celebrates National Breastfeeding Month

Throughout the month, communities nationwide will participate in various activities and events to raise awareness and offer support to breastfeeding families. Each week of National Breastfeeding Month will highlight different aspects of breastfeeding: August 8-14 is Indigenous Milk Medicine, August 15-21 is Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander, and August 25-31 is Black Breastfeeding Week.

In honor of National Breastfeeding month, the Solano County Breastfeeding Coalition is hosting its seventh annual Donor Breast Milk Drive and celebration to recognize mothers for their role in developing healthy infants, families and communities. Families are encouraged to attend and participate in fun activities and enjoy light snacks and refreshments while visiting with local community resource programs.

The celebration will be held on Thursday, August 8 from 11 a.m. – 1:30 p.m. in the Multi-Purpose Room of the Family Health Services building, located at 2101 Courage Drive in Fairfield.

During the celebration, the Mother's Milk Bank of San Jose will be the present to receive breast milk donations from registered donors. The Mother's Milk Bank of San Jose is the only milk bank in Northern California, as well as the only organization in Northern California to be accredited by the Human Milk Banking Association of North America for adherence to standards for processing and delivering human milk to hospitals and families in need. Information will be available to learn how to become a registered donor.

The Mother's Milk Bank of San Jose collects breast milk from mothers with additional milk supply that they would like to donate to babies in need. The Milk Bank staff screens the donors, receives the breast milk, pasteurizes, tests the milk, and then distributes it to medically fragile infants who are in need at neonatal intensive care units throughout California.

# Vallejo City Unified School District and Touro University Conclude Successful Mobile Vaccination Program

The Vallejo City Unified School District and Touro

University have concluded their partnership in the Touro Child and Adult Resource Education and Support Mobile Vaccination Program (CARES MVP). This program aims to help underserved communities overcome barriers to vaccination by taking clinics directly to them.

The program, funded by Touro Cares MVP Vaccine Grants from Kaiser East Bay Community Foundation, Kaiser Foundation Hospitals, Partnership Health Plan of California, and the Solano County Department of Public Health, began its mobile clinics during the pandemic to increase vaccine access.

The initiative launched its first VCUSD-hosted clinic at the John Finney Education Complex in May 2021 and wrapped up its final clinic at the same location in May 2024. Over its duration, the program held 375 clinics, including 122 at 12 different VCUSD schools, administering 4,604 vaccines.

These vaccines, which included COVID-19, influenza, and TDAP vaccines, along with other services provided, such as education, blood glucose and pressure checks, and referrals to other institutions, reached approximately 9,000 community members.

"We are immensely proud of the CARES MVP initiative's impact on our community," Vallejo City Unified School District Superintendent Rubén Aurelio said. "This partnership with Touro University has been crucial in providing essential vaccines to those who might not otherwise have had access. It's a testament to our commitment to health and education and creating equitable opportunities for all. We are grateful to all our partners and community members who made this program a success."

The initiative aligned with our strategic plan pillars: equitable opportunities, equitable outcomes, and community-centered education, focused on underserved communities who otherwise

might not have had access to vaccines and hosting clinics in their neighborhoods.

The Benicia Public Library will present a special program about the 1964 Freedom Summer at 2 p.m., on Saturday, August 24 at the Benicia Public Library.


Freedom Summer 1964 was a pivotal moment in the Civil Rights Movement, where hundreds of volunteers, primarily college students, traveled to Mississippi to register African American voters, establish Freedom Schools, and challenge the systemic racism that had long pervaded the region. This summer of activism played a crucial role in advancing civil rights and social justice in the United States.

The event will be emceed by Alice Fried of the Solano County League of Women Voters and will include former Benicia Poet Laureate Mary Susan Gast (2020-2023), who participated in Freedom Summer as a college student, will share "Gifts from Freedom Summer –1964" followed by a character interpretation of Fannie Lou Hamer. Hamer, who rose from humble beginnings in the Mississippi Delta to become one of the most important, passionate, and powerful voices of the civil and voting rights movements and a leader in the efforts for greater economic opportunities for African Americans, will be brought to life by local performer and activist Linda Youngblood Wright.

The event will also include refreshments and an opportunity for Q&A about Freedom Summer 1964 and continued efforts to protect voting rights across our country. Join in as the community remembers, reflects, and recommits to the ideals of justice, equality, and freedom for all.

# **Speaker Series: Telesforo Trinidad and Filipinos in the US Navy**



Join in for an insightful afternoon at Mare Island Historic Park Foundation's Speaker Series on Sunday, August 18 at 3 p.m. in St. Peter's Chapel.

The distinguished speaker, Cecilia I. Gaerlan, is the proud daughter of a Bataan Death March survivor, who will present Telesforo Trinidad and Filipinos in the US Navy.

Vallejo's population is over 20% Filipino, and a significant reason for that is the United States Navy. On January 15, 1921, aboard USS San Diego (ACR-6) Fireman Second Class Telesforo Trinidad heroically rescued two shipmates following boiler explosions in two firerooms. At great risk to his life and suffering from severe burns to his face, he lived up to the military ethos to "leave no man behind." Trinidad is the only Asian American during peacetime to ever receive the Medal of Honor for heroism above and beyond the call of duty.

Ms. Cecilia I. Gaerlan is the founder and executive director of the Bataan Legacy Historical Society and was a founding member of the campaign that resulted in the naming of the first U.S. Navy ship after a Filipino American sailor, the USS Telesforo Trinidad (DDG-

139). Her organization also changed the California Department of Education's 11th-grade history curriculum to include a discussion of the Philippines in World War II. She also sits on the Board of Trustees of the Hornet Sea, Air and Space Museum.
