The benefits outlined in the webinar were based on many assumptions by each Agency, of strategies which may or may not come to fruition. There seems to be a lot to gain by the larger, populated counties, such as San Francisco, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Alameda and Contra Costa. In contrast, there are far less growth predictions or potential improvement strategies for the North Bay Area counties, such as Solano, Napa, Sonoma and Marin. The caveat however is that each county will potentially foot the bill for 35 proposed strategies for improved housing, the economy, transportation and the environment that will benefit the larger populated counties outlined above. Overall costs for the implementation of the assumed strategies are approximately \$1.38 trillion. Is that fair and equitable? Maybe if you live in San Francisco, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Alameda and Contra Costa counties, but certainly not for the north Bay Area counties. You may want to study the draft proposals and related documents; the links are provided below.

#### What is the Plan Bay Area 2050+ Blueprint?

The Blueprint is essentially a draft version of the plan, which according to the agencies must be updated every 4 years. It is a foundational framework for a future vision of the Bay Area that includes:

- Forecasts and Assumptions about the Bay Area's future (population, jobs, financial needs and revenues, sea level rise, etc.);
- Strategies for public investment and policy reform; and
- **Geographies**where future housing and/or job growth can be focused under the plan's Strategies.

The Blueprint is then analyzed through computer-generated models and simulations to measure how successful the strategies are in achieving shared goals for the future, such as housing affordability, reduced greenhouse gas emissions and much more.

#### What is the Draft Transit 2050+ Network?

It is the result of a first-of-its-kind planning effort for a better Bay Area public transit system and outlines how to make trips faster and more frequent at all times of day and how to connect more communities by bus, train or ferry. Staff from MTC and the region's transit agencies worked closely together to identify a series of improvements and investments that could be made over the next 25 years to keep the Bay Area's transit system operating while expanding it for the future.

The Draft Transit 2050+ Network plan identifies key strategies and investments to advance these priorities. Included in the Draft Network are 6 strategies that aim to enhance the customer experience and increase ridership:

- Operate and maintain the existing transit network
- Better coordinate fares, signage and more across transit agencies
- Improve the transfer timing at key regional hubs
- Enhance security, safety and cleanliness on transit
- Enhance transit frequency, capacity and reliability

MTC Staff recently conducted a Needs, Gaps, and Opportunities Assessment focused on near-term transit service needs, followed by an assessment of major capital and operating projects through the Project Performance Assessment, these data-driven analyses were considered in tandem with public and stakeholder feedback to shape the Draft Transit 2050+ Network.

# Pop-up Events Focus on Plan Bay Area 2050+ Blueprint, Future Transit Network

The Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) and the Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) invite Bay Area residents to help shape the future of the region through 2050 by providing their input at a series of "Pop-Up" events to be held in each of the nine Bay Area' counties.

MTC and ABAG will host 18 Plan Bay Area 2050+ pop-ups over the next six weeks, with agency staff on hand to hear the public's thoughts on strategies to meet the Bay Area's goals for transit recovery, housing affordability, post-pandemic economic growth, and environmental health and sustainability. Public participation is key to the development of Plan Bay Area 2050+. The next edition of the region's long-range plan for transportation, housing, economic development and environmental resilience is scheduled for adoption by MTC and ABAG late next year.

Conversations will focus on collecting input to inform the development of the Final Blueprint and address identified Draft Blueprint challenges; determining early priorities for implementing Plan Bay Area 2050+; and discussing the new Draft Transit 2050+ Network — which identifies a series of improvements that could be

made over the next 25 years to keep the Bay Area's transit network operating while expanding it for the future.

# Board of Supervisors seeks community's help identifying centenarians for recognition ceremony



A Solano County press release:

The Solano County Board of Supervisors needs the community's help in identifying centenarians living in our community for recognition at an upcoming Board of Supervisors

meeting later this fall as part of the 17<sup>th</sup> annual centenarian commemoration celebration.

For the past 16 years, the Solano County Board of Supervisors has recognized and honored centenarians by hosting a celebration for them during a Board of Supervisors meeting. The commemoration serves to capture and share the stories of some of Solano County's oldest residents, while bringing attention to some of the issues facing the senior population.

This year, as part of the commemoration event, the Board will receive a video presentation of Solano County's Centenarians, sharing stories from their amazing lives. The Board has hired a professional videographer who will come to your home (or place of your choosing) to conduct the video interview. Information collected at the interviews will also be included as part of a commemorative yearbook, distributed to all Centenarians shortly after the commemoration event. Centenarians who wish not to conduct an interview are still encouraged to submit information, including a biography and photographs to help tell their life story.

To date the Board has honored more than 225 centenarians in Solano County. Two centenarians reached super-centenarian status, including Marie West in 2011 and Reta Wills in 2021. Super-centenarians are those individuals who have reached the age of 110 years or older, which only occurs at a rate of about 1 in 7 million people.

According to the Boston University School of Medicine, 2022 New England Centenarian Study, out of a population of 336.9 million people, there were approximately 89,739 centenarians living in the United States, or a prevalence of 0.27 percent of the total population. The prevalence of centenarians living in the United States has been increasing over time and nearly doubled in the past 20 years. In addition to genetics, physical activity and social support, scientists liken our ability to prevent and treat diseases like

cancer, pneumonia and stroke to be a strong indicator this trend will likely continue.

#### Amid COVID wave, is it time to mask up?

The summer COVID surge continues to sweep through the Bay Area, and one Bay Area County is <u>recommending people mask up</u>.

Health officials in Contra Costa County renewed their advice to wear face masks in crowded indoor settings, particularly for those at high risk for severe illness.

Contra Costa County health officer Dr. Ori Tzvieli said the emergence of highly transmissible coronavirus variants have led to a notable increase in infections and emergency room visits throughout the summer. The FLiRT variants, named after the location of their spike protein mutations, are approximately 20% more transmissible than the JN.1 strain that drove the winter surge.

"Face masks are an effective tool to reduce the spread of the virus, particularly for those who are at risk for serious illness when there is evidence of elevated COVID-19 activity in the community," Tzvieli said. "This is one of those times. Our health system is not seriously impacted by COVID currently, and our goal is to keep it that way."

California's wastewater virus levels remain at a "very high" mark, accompanied by a steady rise in emergency room visits and an increase in test positivity. Experts point to summer travel and

spending more time in air-conditioned spaces for increased COVID transmission.

Some people in the Bay Area are struggling to find COVID tests at drugstores and are <u>facing difficulties getting vaccinated</u> ahead of the updated fall shots. The summer swell has led to renewed attention on COVID symptoms, precautions and testing. Here's the <u>latest COVID guidance</u>.

### Saying goodbye to Social Security Benefits – The list of retirees losing checks year after year

The SSA provides monthly benefits to more than 70 million beneficiaries, but these **Social Security benefits** could be at risk due to three things they might be unaware of. If you receive Social Security benefits in 2025, you may receive an income increase to offset the effects of inflation. Unfortunately, these benefits are not guaranteed; according to a June 8 NPR article, an average of 70,000 Social Security beneficiaries have their benefits reduced each year. If you qualify for Social Security benefits, learn more about how you could potentially lose your monthly benefits and what to do to avoid being affected.

Whether you receive Social Security, Social Security Disability Insurance, or Supplemental Security Income, you may lose your monthly payments due to certain occurrences, some of which are beyond your control. Fairfield Forward 2050 consists of a General Plan Update, Climate Action Plan, and Environmental Impact Report (EIR). If adopted, the General Plan Update would guide future land use decisions in the City of Fairfield, providing a long-term vision for the future and, through its policies and implementing actions, indicating how that vision would be achieved over the next 25 years. The Climate Action Plan (CAP) would address the community's greenhouse gas emissions (GHG) and demonstrate how the City will comply with State GHG emission reduction targets.

The Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) analyzes how adopting and implementing the goals, policies, actions, and projected buildout of the Fairfield Forward 2050 project. An EIR is intended to inform decision-makers and the general public of the potential significant environmental impacts of a proposed project. The proposed project will result in unavoidable significant impacts with regards to agricultural resources, mineral resources, and transportation.

### No Online Utility Payments August 13 - 20

The Fairfield Municipal Water Utility is transitioning to a new online customer portal, MyFMU by SilverBlaze, on August 21.

During the system transition period, online payments will NOT be allowed August 13 - 20.

This includes satellite payment locations and J.A.C.K payment kiosks. Those who wish to make

a payment during this time will need to pay by cash, check, or money order at the front counter. Checks may also be mailed.

This new portal is designed to significantly enhance user experience and will be accessible on desktop and mobile devices.

The MyFMU portal will offer several new features including:

- Enhanced autopay
- Access to payment history
- Detailed water usage history

Once the MyFMU portal is launched customers will need to reregister using the same account number. For customers registering for autopay and paying with a credit or debit card, a fee of \$2.95 per payment will be charged by the credit card processor. Payments made via ACH, check, or cash will not incur additional fees.



# **Speaker Series: Telesforo Trinidad and Filipinos in the US Navy**



Join in for an insightful afternoon at Mare Island Historic Park Foundation's Speaker Series on Sunday, August 18 at 3 p.m. in St. Peter's Chapel.

The distinguished speaker, Cecilia I. Gaerlan, is the proud daughter of a Bataan Death March survivor, who will present Telesforo Trinidad and Filipinos in the US Navy.

Vallejo's population is over 20% Filipino, and a significant reason for that is the United States Navy. On January 15, 1921, aboard USS San Diego (ACR-6) Fireman Second Class Telesforo Trinidad heroically rescued two shipmates following boiler explosions in two firerooms. At great risk to his life and suffering from severe burns to his face, he lived up to the military ethos to "leave no man behind." Trinidad is the only Asian American during peacetime to ever receive the Medal of Honor for heroism above and beyond the call of duty.

Ms. Cecilia I. Gaerlan is the founder and executive director of the Bataan Legacy Historical Society and was a founding member of the campaign that resulted in the naming of the first U.S. Navy ship after a Filipino American sailor, the USS Telesforo Trinidad (DDG-139). Her organization also changed the California Department of Education's 11th-grade history curriculum to include a discussion of the Philippines in World War II. She also sits on the Board of Trustees of the Hornet Sea, Air and Space Museum.

The event will be emceed by Alice Fried of the Solano County League of Women Voters and will include former Benicia Poet Laureate Mary Susan Gast (2020-2023), who participated in Freedom Summer as a college student, will share "Gifts from Freedom Summer –1964" followed by a character interpretation of Fannie Lou Hamer. Hamer, who rose from humble beginnings in the Mississippi Delta to become one of the most important, passionate, and powerful voices of the civil and voting rights movements and a leader in the efforts for greater economic opportunities for African Americans, will be brought to life by local performer and activist Linda Youngblood Wright.
