Consumer Alert-Commissioner Lara secures important health and safety protections for California consumer



Insurance Commissioner Ricardo Lara thanked Governor Gavin Newsom last week for protecting California consumers through the signing of six bills that he sponsored this legislative session. These new laws focus on improving protections for vulnerable individuals, including women and LGBTQ+ families, disaster survivors, immigrants, and seniors. The laws guarantee insurance coverage for fertility treatments, implement important emergency disaster planning for LGBTQ+ youth, and protect reproductive health care without out-ofpocket expenses for consumers,

among others.

"Protecting consumers is my number one priority," said Commissioner Lara. "I am using every tool available to protect Californians, especially families, seniors, and those most vulnerable to abuse or disaster. I am grateful to the many legislators and partners who worked with me to champion these important issues and thank Governor Newsom for signing these bills that ensure the health and safety of Californians.

Expanding access and ensuring anti-discrimination in health and other insurance

Senate Bill 729, authored by Senator Caroline Menjivar, requires insurance coverage for fertility and infertility care under disability insurance policies and large group health plans. This protects Californians' access to in-vitro fertilization (IVF), and updates the definition of infertility to be inclusive of LGBTQ+ family planning experiences, despite any federal action to limit this coverage. This applies to large and small group health care service plan contracts and disability insurance policies issued, amended, or renewed on or after July 1, 2025. For CalPERS, the mandate begins July 1, 2027. SB 729 was co-sponsored with the Alliance for Fertility Preservation, the American Society for Reproductive Medicine, Equality California, Our Family Coalition, and RESOLVE: The National Infertility Association.

Assembly Bill 2258, authored by Assemblymember Rick Chavez Zbur, makes sure that all Californians have access to affordable and preventive health care without out-of-pocket costs. This includes mandatory coverage for critical reproductive health care including contraceptives such as intrauterine device (IUDs), HIV prevention medications like pre-exposure prophylaxis (PEP) and post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP), and screenings for HIV and other sexually transmitted infections (STIs). AB 2258 was co-sponsored with APLA Health, Equality California, the Los Angeles LGBT Center, and the San Francisco AIDS Foundation.

Protecting vulnerable Californians

Senate Bill 990, authored by Senator Steve Padilla, updates the State Emergency Plan to include best practices for local government and non-governmental entities to equitably serve LGBTQ+ communities during an emergency or natural disaster. This responds to <u>data</u> showing that LGBTQ+ people are more likely to become homeless or face negative health impacts after a disaster. SB 990 was co-sponsored with Equality California and the California Legislative LGBTQ+ Caucus. This update is required to occur as soon as possible, but no later than January 1, 2029, and be updated every five years.

Senate Bill 263, authored by Senator Bill Dodd, protects Californians, especially vulnerable seniors, from potential abuse and exploitation by curtailing harmful sales of annuities that are not in the consumer's best interest. Annuities are typically marketed to retirees to provide a guaranteed income stream. California will now adopt the updated NAIC Suitability in Annuity Transactions Model Regulation, creating additional consumer protections to ensure California's insurance companies and licensed producers who sell annuities are following the highest standards of conduct.

Assembly Bill 2780, authored by Assemblymember Tina McKinnor, protects the safety of newly arrived immigrants by requiring commercial passenger transportation, prior to transporting 10 or more vulnerable passengers, to notify local authorities and follow basic requirements. This important piece of legislation will ensure California has the proper tools and support to welcome migrants in a humane manner and with the dignity and respect that migrants deserve. AB 2780 was co-sponsored by the Coalition for Humane Immigrant Rights.

Updating important insurance laws

<u>Senate Bill 577</u>, authored by Senator Melissa Hurtado, helps clarify existing law, deletes obsolete and superseded code sections, and creates new laws agreed to between the Department and stakeholders.

"I am very proud of the work we have done with our legislative partners this year to secure crucial protections for California consumers," added Commissioner Lara. "As we look ahead to next session, I aim to push solutions to help address more insurancerelated problems while further expanding consumer protections in partnership with legislators and key stakeholders."

All of these sponsored measures go into effect on January 1, 2025, unless otherwise noted.

California's BEAD Initial Proposal Approved, Unlocking \$1.86 Billion in Lastmile Funding

The National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) recently approved California's proposed subgrantee

selection rules contained in the CPUC's Initial Proposal Volume 2, unlocking over \$1.86 billion in Broadband Equity Access and Deployment (BEAD) program funds.

At NTIA's October 4, 2024, press conference, Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Communications and Information and NTIA Administrator Alan Davidson noted that "California can move their Internet for All efforts from planning to action." Assistant Secretary Davidson congratulated the CPUC for developing a strong proposal outlining how California will connect all residents to high-speed Internet service.

Police investigating another hidden camera found in bushes outside Southern California home

Police in Arcadia have launched an investigation after a camera camouflaged to look like shrubbery was found outside a home.

The camera was discovered Tuesday morning by a homeowner who called police after discovering the device hidden in the bushes in front of their house.

Authorities say if you discover a hidden camera near your home, you should <u>contact local law enforcement</u> immediately.

Other tips that can prevent you from becoming a victim include:

- Never leave a hidden key outside your home.
- If you spot a suspicious vehicle, write down the license plate and report it.
- Always lock doors and windows when leaving, even for a short time.
- Keep your front porch and exteriors well-lit.
- Keep trees and bushes trimmed so they don't become hiding spots for thieves.
- Install home security cameras and monitor them frequently.
- If you spot a broken window or open door, do not enter the home; call police immediately

On September 25, Reps. Garret Graves (R-La.) and Abigail Spanberger (D-Va.) led a discharge petition for the bipartisan Social Security Fairness Act (<u>H.R. 82</u>) which would repeal the <u>Windfall</u>

<u>Elimination Provision</u> (WEP) that impacts the retirement benefits of certain public sector employees. Eliminating the WEP would give public employees access to their full social security benefits, putting

an end to a reduction of benefits for 2.1 million county and state employees.



Building Appliance Rules Public Learning Session



The Bay Area Air Quality Management District is hosting a public learning session on **Tuesday, October 22, from 6 to 7:30 p.m.** virtually via Zoom regarding adopted amendments to <u>Rule 9-4: Nitrogen Oxides from</u> <u>Fan Type Residential Central</u> <u>Furnaces</u> and <u>Rule 9-6: Nitrogen</u>

Oxides Emissions from Natural Gas-Fired Boilers and Water <u>Heaters</u> ("Building Appliance Rules"). Members of the public are invited to attend to learn and ask questions about the Building Appliance Rules.

On March 15, 2023, the Air District adopted amendments to <u>Rule 9-4: Nitrogen Oxides from Fan Type Residential Central</u> <u>Furnaces</u> and <u>Rule 9-6: Nitrogen Oxides Emissions from Natural</u> <u>Gas-Fired Boilers and Water Heaters</u> that govern point of sale emission standards for small, typically residential and commercial, water and space heating systems. Space and water-heating appliances generate a large portion of nitrogen oxide (NOx) emissions from sources in the Bay Area. NOx is formed during natural gas combustion when ambient nitrogen and oxygen combine at high temperatures. The amendments will substantially reduce NOx emissions from these appliances and therefore secondary particulate matter formation. The implementation of these rule amendments will be a multiyear effort, spanning from 2027 to 2031.

As part of the amendments, the Air District convened the Implementation Working Group (IWG) between May 2023 through August 2024. The IWG was comprised of over 40 invited stakeholders representing a variety of relevant stakeholder segments. The purpose of the IWG was to provide input to Air District staff's periodic reports to the Board of Directors on the implementation of the Building Appliances Rules and to provide the Air District staff with insights on the technical readiness of the market and equitable transition to compliant appliances, so as to not unduly burden any income class or professional group. As such, the IWG provided a forum for invited members to discuss technical and equity aspects of implementing the Building Appliances Rules.

Fairfield Forward 2050: Next steps through adoption

The public comment period for Fairfield Forward 2050, consisting of a General Plan Update, Climate Action Plan, and Environmental Impact Report (EIR), closed in September 2024. The Public Drafts remain available on the Fairfield Forward 2050 project website



at www.fairfieldforward.com.

Public comments will be published on the project website after Wednesday, October 9. Responses to Draft General Plan Update and Draft Climate Action Plan comments will be provided in future staff reports for the Planning Commission and City Council. Responses to Draft EIR comments will be provided in the Final EIR.

Next steps through adoption are as follows:

- November 6, 2024: Special meeting of the Planning Commission to review and make a recommendation to the City Council
- December 3, 2024: Regular City Council meeting to vote on the adoption of the Fairfield Forward 2050 project

Notice of Public Availability of 2024 Refinery Flare Minimization Plan Annual Updates

The Bay Area Air Quality Management District (BAAQMD) is releasing the 2024 Flare Minimization Plan (FMP) Annual Updates for public review and comment. The five Bay Area refineries prepared these plans subject to <u>Regulation 12, Rule 12:</u> <u>Flares at Refineries</u>.



Under Regulation 12-12, each FMP Annual Update must include:

- New prevention measures identified during investigations of flaring events that occurred during the period July 1, 2023 – June 30, 2024;
- A description of the prevention measures previously taken or currently planned to reduce flare emissions at the refinery;
- Commitment to implement all new feasible prevention measures expeditiously; and
- A 30-day public comment review period

The plan updates are now available for review on the Air District's <u>Flare Minimization Plans</u> web page.

The deadline to submit public comments regarding the 2024 FMP Annual Updates is **November 8.**

Be sure to identify which refinery, or refineries, your comment is applicable to.

After consideration of public comments received, the Air District will evaluate each refinery's Flare Minimization Plan Annual Update to determine whether it meets the requirements of Regulation 12-12 and will take final action in accordance with the regulation.

Valero, oil shipper Amports to pay \$3.3 million after unusual S.F. Bay pollution case is settled

The Valero oil company and Amports, owner of terminals that ship oil products, have agreed to pay \$3.3 million to settle a lawsuit by the environmental group SF Baykeeper, which said the companies had discharged petroleum coke pollutants into bay waters outside Valero's refinery in Benicia.

The settlement, <u>approved Monday by a federal judge</u>, includes \$2.38 million to be paid to the nonprofit Rose Foundation for Communities and the Environment, which will distribute it to local groups for projects related to water quality. The rest will go to SF Baykeeper for costs related to the lawsuit that it filed in March 2022.



Rio Vista Bridge Scheduled for Multiple 55-Hour Closures



Caltrans is advising motorists of a scheduled closure of the Rio Vista Bridge (Helen Madere Memorial Bridge) on State Route 12 (SR-12) just east of the City of Rio Vista due to a paving project.

The \$11.24 million project through the Bridge Rehabilitation and Replacement Program will require multiple 55-hour weekend closures for the work to be completed.

The project will make necessary bridge repairs and updates by rehabilitating the roadway surface, placing polyester concrete overlay on the bridge deck, replacing bridge rails, installing bridge approach slabs, and constructing Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant switchback ramps.

These upgrades will improve motorist and non-vehicular bridge users' safety, restore bridge deck integrity, comply with ADA accessibility requirements and expand access for pedestrians and non-motor vehicles, and improve the overall ride quality.

The 55-hour weekend bridge closure schedule will lessen total project workdays and help avoid the wait times during peak commute hours during the work week.

Motorists could encounter additional travel times of up to two hours using the described detours (see maps provided) from Rio Vista to Sacramento County on SR-12 across the Sacramento River. Please allow for extra travel time to reach your destination, especially for scheduled appointments and work schedules.


All work on road construction projects will be suspended on weekends and holidays. Schedules are subject to change due to

SolTrans' Call for Artists: Miro Salazar
