Phishing: A method of cyberattack that attempts to trick victims into clicking on fraudulent links in emails. The link usually takes the victim to a seemingly legitimate form that asks them to type in their usernames, passwords, account numbers or other private information,

which is directly sent to scammers.

Smishing: Somes in the form of a text message and will often contain a fraudulent link that takes victims to a form that is used to steal their information. Can also download malware such as viruses, ransomware, spyware or adware onto the victim's device.

<u>Vishing</u>: Scammers call potential victims, often using prerecorded robocalls, pretending to be a legitimate company to solicit personal information such as driver's license number, social security number, credit card information, first and last name and address from a victim.

How to Prevent them

- 1. Never click on links from someone you don't know.
- 2. Never give out personal information to someone who contacts you out of the blue.
- 3. Don't answer calls or texts from numbers you don't recognize.

How to Protect Yourself if Your Information Has Been Stolen

- Credit freeze: You can freeze your credit for free with all three national credit bureaus. (https://www.experian.com/blogs/ask-experian/credit-education/preventing-fraud/security-freeze/).
- Personal privacy scan: You can find out if your personal info
 is out on the web with Experian's personal privacy scan.

- 3. Identity theft protection: For complete identity theft protection after you've been victimized by a scammer. (https://www.experian.com/protection/identity-theft-and-credit-protection/)
- 4. Dark web surveillance

- 6. Payday & non-credit loan alerts
- 7. Change of address alerts
- 8. Financial account activity monitoring

of the <u>Bay Area Transit Transformation Action Plan</u> to improve the customer experience for transit riders.

The first of the frameworks to be explored for a possible ballot measure in 2026 is a 10-year, half-cent sales tax that would appear on the ballot in Alameda, Contra Costa, San Francisco and San Mateo counties, with an option for Santa Clara County to participate as well. Under this scenario, the sales tax would generate about \$560 million each year, with 90 percent of the money used to support transit operations and the remaining 10 percent going to make customer-focused improvements to transit, such as fare discounts when a rider uses more than one transit agency on a single trip and projects to help buses bypass traffic.

The second framework — which would raise an estimated \$1.3 billion to \$1.5 billion each year — includes a 30-year, half-cent sales tax plus a parcel tax of nine cents per square foot of any building(s) on the property. This 'hybrid' measure would appear on the ballot in Alameda, Contra Costa, San Francisco and San Mateo counties, with an opt-in provision for Santa Clara, Marin, Napa, Solano and Sonoma counties. As with the first framework, 90 percent of the money from the sales tax portion would be used to support transit operations and 10 percent would be invested to improve the customer experience for transit riders. Sixty percent of parcel tax revenues would be used to support transit operations with the remaining 40 percent reserved as a "county flex" available to address a range of transportation needs in each participating county.

Another framework for which polling will be conducted would involve tax rates that vary by county. Developed by the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency, this third option would feature a higher tax rate in San Francisco (which has proportionally higher transit operating needs than other counties), a lower rate in Santa Clara County, and equivalent rates in Alameda, Contra Costa and San Mateo counties.

The Commission also approved several policy provisions for inclusion in new state legislation that would enable voters to consider a future ballot measure, including requiring stronger oversight of transit agencies' financial information and requiring transit agencies to adopt policies to help improve the transit customer experience as a condition for receiving new funds. The Commission recommended against including transit agency consolidation as a topic for enabling legislation.

MTC engaged Oakland-based EMC Research to conduct public opinion polling. EMC will poll Bay Area residents on the potential tax frameworks in early 2025, with results reported to the Commission in February.

MTC's pursuit of more information about the proposed tax frameworks and associated policy provisions follows work done earlier this year by a Transportation Revenue Measure Select

Committee established to help reach consensus for state legislation in 2025 that would authorize Bay Area voters consider a 2026 ballot measure to preserve and enhance public transit in the region. MTC Commissioner and Select Committee Chair Jim Spering of Solano County noted in October, "There are three things a ballot measure must eventually do. It needs to generate enough revenue to address our most immediate transit shortfalls; it needs to introduce transformative changes to our transit systems that Bay Area residents have been asking for; and it needs to be a measure that voters will support, with coordination and vision."

Rio Vista Bridge scheduled for third 55hour closure



Caltrans is advising motorists of a scheduled closure of the Rio Vista Bridge (Helen Madere Memorial Bridge) on State Route 12 (SR-12) for ongoing repairs.

The weekend closure has been rescheduled to 9 p.m. Friday, January 10 through to 4 a.m. Monday, January 13.

This \$11.24 million project funded through the Bridge Rehabilitation and Replacement Program will require multiple 55-hour weekend closures for the work to be completed because of the limited width of the bridge to allow for heavy equipment access.

The project is making necessary mechanical repairs and rehabilitating the roadway surface by placing a polyester concrete overlay on the bridge deck. Work also includes replacing bridge rails, repaying bridge approach ramps, and constructing Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant ramps.

Delays for the arrival of bridge materials and a request from the city of Rio Vista has extended the original date.

Yolo County: 55-hour Closure Scheduled for Enterprise Boulevard Ramps-Signed Detours in Place for Motorists to Eastbound U.S. Highway 50



Caltrans is alerting motorists of upcoming extended weekend ramp closures for the ongoing Yolo Interstate 80 (I-80) and U.S. Highway 50 (US-50) Pavement Rehabilitation Project.

Construction work will include a closure of the Enterprise Boulevard on- and off-ramps to eastbound US-50. Caltrans urges motorists to plan for additional travel time and to expect delays.

SCHEDULED CLOSURE:

• 9 p.m. Friday, January 10 to 5 a.m. Monday, January 13

DETOUR:

- Eastbound US-50 motorists can exit at Harbor Boulevard (EXIT 1) east of Enterprise Boulevard.
- Motorists on West Capitol Avenue can continue to Industrial Boulevard, then Harbor Boulevard to US-50 (see detour map).

The work zone is from the just west of the Yolo Causeway through I-80 and US 50 in West Sacramento. The speed limit has been reduced to 55 miles per hour 24/7 for the safety of workers and motorists. Work is scheduled to begin as listed but subject to change due to traffic incidents, weather conditions, availability of equipment and/or materials, and construction-related issues.

The extended lane closures will help to minimize the duration of the work and improve workers' safety.

This \$280 million project includes \$47 million from Senate Bill (SB 1), the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017. SB 1 provides \$5 billion in transportation funding annually, shared equally between state and local agencies. Road projects progress through construction phases more quickly based on the availability of SB 1 funds, including projects partially funded by SB 1. Income-eligible programs that can help customers lower their bills:

- <u>California Alternate Rates for Energy (CARE)</u>
 <u>Program</u> offers a discount of 20% or more each month on energy bills.
- <u>Family Electric Rate Assistance (FERA) Program</u> offers a monthly discount of 18% on electricity bills for households with three or more people.
- Low Income Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP): a
 federally funded assistance program overseen by the state
 that offers a one-time payment up to \$1,000 on past due
 bills to help low-income households pay for heating or
 cooling in their homes.

Energy Efficiency Support Programs

- GoGreen Home Financing: a statewide program which offers affordable financing for energy efficiency upgrades to help homeowners and renters reduce their energy use.
- Golden State Rebates: This is a statewide program that provides residential residents with instant rebates on energy-efficient products including smart thermostats, air conditioners, and water heaters. Homeowners and renters are eligible to receive these rebates through single-use coupons they can redeem in-store or online at participating retailers.

Little Hoover Commission Biennial Report (2023-24)



A Little Hoover Commission press release:

The Little Hoover Commission released 13 reports in the 2023-24 biennium, according to a new report summarizing the work of the independent, nonpartisan watchdog agency. The new report, *Advocating for Change*, 2023-24, also notes that 15 bills supported by the

Commission to implement its recommendations were passed by the Legislature and signed by the Governor.

The studies released by the Commission during the past two years touch upon a wide array of policy areas, including how the state cares for those with developmental disabilities, efforts to divert organic materials out of landfills, the impact of the aging of the state's population, the California Environmental Quality Act, the state's response to retail theft, the homeowners insurance market, and the use of artificial intelligence in state government.

The state also released several reports examining how well its past recommendations had been implemented, including with regard to intimate partner violence, human trafficking for purposes of labor exploitation, and the state's Medi-Cal Dental Program. Each report follows an extensive hearing and study process by the Commission and its staff, including testimony from a variety of affected groups, a review of existing research, and in some cases original datagathering by staff.

"Our Commission searches for ways to make state government work better for Californians," said Commission Chairman Pedro Nava. "By focusing on the facts and digging deep, we offer practical solutions to the problems facing our state."

After making recommendations for policy change, the Commission supports actions, including legislation, that implement its recommendations. The new report outlines Commission-supported bills signed into law this biennium on topics including the developmental disabilities system, labor trafficking, intimate partner violence, open-meetings laws, organic waste disposal, and customer-centric government.

The Commission includes nine public members and four sitting members of the Legislature, who are appointed by a combination of the Governor and legislative leadership. By law, no one political party may control more than five of the nine public seats. The Commission is charged in statute with making reform recommendations that foster "economy, efficiency and improved service."

Public hearings

State Route 37 Sears Point to Mare Island Improvement Project



State Route 37 is an important regional connection linking the north, east and west SF Bay Region following along the northern shore of San Pablo Bay. This 21-mile-long roadway from US 101 to I-80 connects job markets and housing within Marin, Sonoma, Napa and Solano counties.

The future of the State Route 37 Corridor requires finding solutions to traffic congestion, periodic flooding, and rising sea levels. But it will also require balancing transportation needs with protecting and enhancing sensitive marshland habitats. Planning a long-term solution presents an opportunity to provide bicycle, pedestrian, transit, and carpool options for all travelers, and enhance the quality of life for residents and build stronger local and regional economy for all. Caltrans is working with its <u>partner agencies</u>, The Metropolitan Transportation Commission and the four North Bay County Transportation Agencies to develop a more resilient corridor.

Once you've finished reading from every mile marker, **visit your library** to collect your exclusive **Solano Reads medal** as a token of your achievement. You've earned it!


5. Online Registration and Tracking

Solano County Water Agency accepting entries for Water Awareness Video Contest



The Solano County Water Agency is now accepting entries from Solano County students in grades 6 through 12 and their sponsoring teachers for the Water Agency's 15th annual video contest. Winning entries will receive up to \$1,500.

This year's theme is The Water Cycle: Why We Need to Think Outside the Sink. The contest is challenging students to explore the need for Solano County residents to think globally and act locally in order to conserve water.

Students should create a one-minute public service announcement video explaining how we can all work together to conserve water on a broad scale. In their PSAs, we encourage students to think about all the different ways people, industries, and institutions use water, and to offer creative conservation steps for individuals and our society at-large to take.

This year, the Solano County Water Agency will award prizes of \$1,500 to the first-place video, \$1,000 to the second-place video, and \$500 to the third-place video. Additionally, the winning entry from each school with ten or more submissions will be awarded a \$100 gift card. The three teachers who generate the most student participation in the contest will each win a \$200 gift card.

Entries will be judged by a panel of water efficiency experts and community leaders for content, accuracy, and response to the assigned theme; entertainment value and originality; videography, style and organization; and audio/sound quality.


The CDBG Advisory Committee participates in community meetings and public hearings during the development of the City's 5-Year Consolidated Plan and Annual Action plan update, reviews applications for CDBG funding, receives testimony from applicants, makes annual CDBG allocation recommendations to the City Council and reviews the annual performance and evaluation report detailing the City's progress toward accomplishing the goals set forth in the plan. The recruitment process is ongoing until positions are filled.

Rockville Hills Regional Park fee increase effective in 2025



From the city of Fairfield:

The Fairfield City Council voted unanimously to approve the fee increases at Rockville Hills Regional Park after a recent presentation from City Manager David Gassaway on December 17, 2024.

Entrance fees were budgeted at \$100,000 a year. The cost of managing and maintaining the park is about \$650,000 a year.

An individual day pass, for residents and nonresidents, increases from \$3 to \$5.

The cost of a six-month season pass will go from \$19 (resident) and \$20 (nonresident) to \$30 and \$36, respectively. The family pass jumps from \$32 (resident) and \$35, (nonresident) to \$75 and \$96, respectively.

Fees for disabled residents go from \$10 to \$15. Disabled nonresidents will see the fee go from \$13 to \$21. Those 50 or older will now pay \$10. Older nonresidents will pay \$21. Canine fees will also increase.

A new annual pass will offer some savings. That cost is \$60 for an individual, \$150 for families, \$30 for disabled and seniors 50 or older. The same fee would apply to dogs.

On Tuesday, December 31, 2024, Vallejo City Manager Andrew Murray announced that he has selected Jason Ta to serve as Vallejo's next permanent Police Chief.

He served for over 27 years with the San Jose Police Department in many capacities, including patrol; undercover, gang, robbery, and sexual assault investigations; field training; traffic

enforcement; internal auditing; and community services. Chief Ta departed San Jose at the rank of Captain prior to joining the Vallejo Police Department in 2021 as a Deputy Chief.

Chief Ta has served as the Interim Police Chief since November 2022.

Murray stated that "The City was fortunate to have a pool of strong candidates. Jason distinguished himself by receiving the top rating from all four interview panels as well as having a track record of improving community relationships and advancing the collaborative reform effort. I look forward to working closely with Jason, our Police Officers, the community, and Cal-DOJ to make the Vallejo Police Department a model of community-oriented constitutional policing and a rewarding and fulfilling organization in which to work."

Chief Ta stated that "It has been a privilege serving as the Interim Police Chief for the last two years. I am honored to be selected to lead the department into the future. The Police Chief selection process was very comprehensive. I am thankful for City Manager Murray's confidence in me advancing the department and look forward in working with him. My commitment to the community, city, and department remains steadfast as we continue our journey in elevating the Vallejo Police Department in becoming the "Gold Standard" of public safety. We have come a long way and still have much road ahead. I will continue the work and momentum we have achieved in strengthening and building community engagement and trust, working collaboratively with local, county, state, and federal partners, preventing and reducing crime and quality of life concerns, restoring departmental working conditions and staffing levels, and completing our reform efforts with Cal-DOJ."

Bay Area's Vallejo is getting its first 'diverging diamond' traffic interchange. Here's how it works



Assembly Bill 413 - Effective January 1



From the city of Fairfield:

The State of California recently passed Assembly Bill 413, also known as the Daylighting Bill, which prohibits the stopping, standing, or parking of a vehicle within 20 feet of any unmarked or marked crosswalk or 15 feet of any crosswalk where a curb extension is present.

This existing law also prohibits stopping or parking within an intersection, on a sidewalk or crosswalk, or in front of a fire station. Similar laws exist in 40 states.


- Parked vehicles near crosswalks limit pedestrian visibility, increasing the risk of severe injury or fatal collisions.
- Removing these obstructions helps drivers see pedestrians and lets pedestrians see oncoming cars without stepping into the intersection.

• Intersection daylighting is a proven traffic safety practice. The city has implemented this in school zones as part of safe routes to school and complete streets using physical devices such as signs, markings, and delineator posts.


California's citation enforcement starts on January 1, 2025. Due to the budgetary constraints ongoing maintenance needs the city will be opting NOT to mark every crosswalk location.






