Dear Neighbor,

Happy Lunar New Year, Valentines Day, and Black History Month,

The month of January was a very busy month. I am adjusting to my new board assignments, committee promotions and the readjustments to my calendar. The board welcomed our newest member, County Supervisor Cassandra James who replaces County Supervisor Erin Hannigan, at our first board meeting for the month. Most importantly, I am paying close attention the President's executive orders because his decisions could affect County services provided to the residents of Solano County. It was a sigh of relief when President Trump rescinded his executive order to halt all federal funding which caused a ripple of confusion and chaos for county and nonprofit agencies. Approximately thirty-five percent of our county budget comes from federal and state funding. We work closely with Federal and state departments to run the county Medicare, Veterans services, housing, Headstart, and health and social services just to name a few. My team and I will remain diligent to stay up to date on how future executive orders may affect our county in a positive or negative way.

Last week I received an email from a constituent informing me of AB303 Battery Energy Safety & Accountability Act which is a new bill presented by Assemblymember Addis (Morro Bay) that introduce legislation to bolster community choice and environmental protection in battery projects. My office is reaching out to Assemblymember Wilson's and State Senator Cabaldon's offices to ask for their support of the bill and the county will invite our state lobbying group to review the bill with the board. Last year the county put in place a moratorium on lithium-ion battery projects to give us time to identify best land placement for the storage facilities. Unfortunately, the current state legislation allowed

battery storage operators to override our decision by bypassing the moratorium and it caused Solano County to lose 45 acres of prime Agricultural lands. We need the ability at the local level to regulate placement of battery storage to keep our communities save from uncontrollable battery fires.

During the month of February, we will have an art exhibit curated by Suisun City Artist Gail Brydsong. The art exhibit celebrates Black History month and will be on display for the month of February inside the County Administration building located on the first floor and displayed in the window of the foyer of the Board of Supervisors Chambers. Please stop by and enjoy this free exhibit. Brought to you by Supervisor Williams office.

It is an honor to serve as your County Supervisor and I'm looking forward of bringing new initiatives forward in 2025.

## Supervisors recognize Black History Month in Solano County

FAIRFIELD — Supervisor Monica Brown has long editorialized her belief that "Justice for All," as cited in the Pledge of Allegiance, is little more than something for which to strive.

She has added "some day" after the board ends the pledge at the start of each meeting.

This week, a chorus of Black women emphasized "Justice for All," with ascending voices, as the pledge was recited.

Latressa Wilson Alford, the district representative for Supervisor Wanda Williams, said, in a way, it is borne out of Brown's comment, but ripened by today's political environment when many Blacks, and particularly Black women, think the "clock is going backward."

She said many "don't feel like they are heard; feel like they are not seen," Alford said in a phone interview on Wednesday.

"The fight continues," she said.

Alford is also president of the local chapter of Black Women Organized for Political Action, nearly a dozen members of which were part of the board's recognition of February as Black History Month in the county on Tuesday.

"Black History Month seeks to emphasize Black history and its cultural contributions to American life and is designed to recognize and pay tribute to the many contributions of African Americans to the history, society, and culture of the United States of America," the resolution adopted by the board states.

"African Americans were enslaved in this country; however, they did not board slave ships as slaves, they were kings, queens, healers, doctors, scientists, educators, and entrepreneurs throughout the African diaspora ... Black History Month is a time for all Americans to remember the stories, teachings, suffering, and struggles of African Americans who gave a voice to the daily struggles for freedom, equality, diversity, equity, and inclusion," the resolution adds.

"Black History Month celebrates the spirit, resilience, and achievements of African Americans in the arts, civil rights, education, entertainment, government, history, law, literature, medicine, military, music, politics, science, sports, and other endeavors ... and while we cannot ignore nor erase the consequences of our country's long and unfortunate history of violence, discrimination, systemic racism, and inequities, including the deprivation of African Americans – we can commit to acknowledging our responsibility for those historic and systematic inequities while working together to create a future that is inclusive and equitable for all."

The 2025 theme for Black History Month is "African Americans and Labor," highlighting the central role that Black people's work has played in shaping the United States, Africa and the diaspora. However, Alford said when people talk about history, they tend to think of old history. She admits there is a great value in that. But she said there are individuals who are still alive who inspire and change things for others.

She noted Hazel Wilson, and education and civil rights advocate in Vallejo, Deborah Dickson, another community activist who sits on the Fair Board; as well as longtime educator Dr. LaTayna Young.

"These are living women who are opening doors for us," Alford said.

BWOPA was founded in 1968. The local chapter was formed by K. Patrice Williams, a Fairfield city councilwoman, in 2017.

Supervisor Williams, the first Black woman to be elected to the board and the second Black woman to serve, presented the group with a proclamation out of her district office recognizing the role Blacks have played in Solano.

Supervisor Cassandra James also participated in the recognition.

# Undersheriff DeWall sends letter to BOS answering questions about immigration enforcement in Solano County

Solano County Undersheriff Brad DeWall responded to questions from members of BOS concerning immigration enforcement following the Trump Administration's immigration orders. Undersheriff DeWall emphasized that the "Sheriff's Office has always enforced, and will continue to enforce, laws fairly and equally, regardless of immigration status. If a crime is committed, our community can expect the Sheriff's Office to provide the same level of service and resources, irrespective of immigration status."

The letter continued: "Regarding immigration enforcement, the Sheriff's Office will continue to adhere to California Senate Bill 54 (2017), also known as the California Values Act. This law prohibits law enforcement from investigating, detaining, reporting, or arresting individuals solely for immigration enforcement purposes. However, we will continue to cooperate with all law enforcement agencies—local, state, and federal—on cases involving violent individuals, regardless of their immigration status. Our focus is not on immigration status; it is on public safety."

# BOS awaits passage of Battery Energy Safety & Accountability Act in Assembly

Last Tuesday (1/28/2025), The Solano Board of Supervisors discussed concerns about proposed battery storage facilities in Solano County, and a bill introduced in the Assembly that prohibits battery storage plant operators from bypassing local land use controls. Currently, battery storage operators can apply directly to the California Energy Commission for the necessary approvals to build and operate a plant. This bill would restrengthen the Board's ability to establish and enforce local requirements on such projects that may be pursued in Solano County. The legislation would place local land use and safety decisions in approving any battery storage facility - like environmental setback requirements for sensitive areas, including schools, hospitals, and natural habitats - at the direction of local Board, not a state agency.

The legislation, Assembly Bill 303, was introduced by Assemblymember Dawn Addis (**D-Morro Bay**) following the horrific fire at the Vistra Battery Energy Storage System at the Moss Landing Power Plant in Monterey County. The battery storage facility, it was reported, is the world's largest facility. The fire forced 1200 area residents to evacuate and released smoke plumes that could pose a health threat to humans and wildlife. The incident knocked out 2 per cent of California's energy storage capacity, which the state relies on as part of its transition to use more renewable power and less fossil fuels.
