For the past 18 years, the Solano County Board of Supervisors has celebrated the lives of local centenarians by hosting a special recognition ceremony during a Board meeting. This annual commemoration not only honors some of the county's oldest residents but also highlights their life stories and draws attention to the unique challenges facing the senior community.

The life stories of our centenarians are documented in a hard cover yearbook as well as a video that features interviews with those that can participate. We present the video to the public at a Board of

Area Agency on Aging

Supervisors meeting each year and a copy of the book is given to each centenarian and/or their family as a lasting tribute to their life and contributions to the community. This program, while rewarding for the Board of Supervisors, is really an important part of preserving our County's rich history. These stories become part of the permanent record, not just for future generations of the centenarians' families to hold, but for all of us.

To date the Board has honored more than 275 centenarians in Solano County. Two centenarians reached super-centenarian status, including Marie West in 2011 and Reta Wills in 2021. Super-centenarians are those individuals who have reached 110 years or older, which only occurs at a rate of about 1 in 7 million people.

According to the U.S. Census Bureau 2024 population estimates, approximately 101,000 Americans are aged 100 or older at any given time in the United States, with California having the most at nearly 9,000 residents. Centenarians, according to the Pew Research Center, are predominately women (78 percent), have a family history of long-lived parents, enjoy regular physical activity, have a balanced diet, and maintain close relationships with family and friends.

NASA celebrated Rose Ferreira's story of resilience, then tried to scrub it from the internet. Then they fired her.

Rose Ferreira has had it anything but easy. The trajectory of her life has been so turbulent, in fact, that NASA, her previous employer, published a feature article about her determination on its website. That story chronicles her journey from a poverty-stricken childhood in the Caribbean and years living unhoused, to pursuing her education and rising to become a NASA intern, which ultimately led to working at the space agency full-time.

Rose was born and raised in the poorest area in the Dominican Republic. She endured harsh physical abuse as a child, was sexually assaulted from a young age until she managed to legally immigrate to the U.S. around the age of 16. She moved to New York City, was married to an abusive man who she left and then quickly found herself unhoused and living under a bridge for the next three years.

During this time, she said she had no education and barely spoke any English. Rose spent her days hopping on and off trains to pass the time but was desperate to change her situation. One day, she

noticed an advertisement on a newspaper she was using to cover herself. A home health aide company was hiring care providers with no prior experience and offered 30 days of training. A month later, Rose had a fresh pair of scrubs in hand and began working shifts to save up for an apartment. Eventually, she was able to earn her GED and begin courses at a college.

Rose started at Hunter College, where her academic advisor discouraged her from pursuing a degree in science because she didn't have a math background. They "didn't want to set me up for failure," she said. Around 20 years old at the time, she was not to be deterred. "I didn't listen to anybody. I just enrolled in the classes, and the classes kicked my ass a little bit." The punches would keep coming.

In 2016, while still working her in-home health aide job, Rose was diagnosed with cervical cancer. Then, in 2017, she was hit by a car while walking home from work, which landed her in the hospital. "My life up until 2017 was just working and surviving so I could go to school and get to do space stuff," she said.

Rose left Hunter College and began taking remote courses at Arizona State University (ASU) while recovering and would eventually earn her bachelor's degree in astronomy and planetary sciences. Her coursework at ASU led to her first fellowships at NASA, two subsequent internships at the space agency, and, ultimately, her full-time employment. She has also since earned a master's degree in space systems engineering from Johns Hopkins University, in Maryland.

During her recovery time Rose became heavily involved in outreach and activism for STEM education in disenfranchised communities. She focused on helping schools find ways to make science more interesting and accessible, and providing resources for children coming from schools without science programs. Rose says she is motivated to do this work because of her non-traditional path to becoming a scientist: "I want people to know, 'oh, maybe if she can do it, I can do it.'"

When she was an intern at Goddard Space Flight Center, she worked on the team that helped release the first deep field image from the James Webb Space Telescope and had the chance to record a Spanish voice-over for one of NASA's This Week at NASA videos. She was mentored by Thomas Zurbuchen, former associate administrator for NASA's Science Mission Directorate, and had the opportunity to shadow him at NASA headquarters. It was 2022, the year NASA would publish their feature about her. That same year, she was also honored as a Brooke Owens Fellow for her STEM outreach. Rose was hired full-time at the space agency as an analyst in the beginning of 2024.

"They had a big focus on opening opportunities for people, who normally wouldn't get the chance," Rose said of the fellowship. "For me, that meant opening doors into aerospace."

Rose became so successful in her STEM activism that she was honored at the White House in 2024 as a Young Hispanic Leader in the Space Industry. Just a few months after receiving that honor, President Trump was elected.

The new President's DEI policy removed Rose Ferreira's bio as well as a feature story of her from NASA's website because of the order that went out to remove items about women in STEM. News spread quickly throughout the NASA organization. Within days and after a polarized internet debated her situation, Rose Ferreira's story on NASA's website was suddenly restored. No one from NASA contacted her in any official capacity of what was going on either before or after it was taken down and put back up again. Twenty days after she first posted about her NASA page being taken down - she was fired.

For Rose, she hopes that she can go back in a few years, because her initial plan was to retire at NASA. In the meantime, she is refocusing her attention on her activism and outreach to underserved communities. "I got so focused, I stopped doing outreach completely when I went to NASA, and the only outreach I was doing was within the agency. I felt like I needed to go back to this to give me hope in humanity again."





Solano County Public Health Offers a Day to Get Ready for Kindergarten in Fairfield



From a Solano County press release:

Local health officials are urging parents and guardians to ensure children four to six (4–6) years of age are up to date on their vaccinations before entering

kindergarten. To support this effort, Solano County Public Health is hosting a walk-in Kindergarten Round-Up (KRU) on May 22 at its Fairfield Pediatric clinic site. The KRU will give children entering kindergarten FREE vaccines and referrals for physicals. Solano County Health & Social Services is partnering with Partnership HealthPlan of California, First 5 Solano, and Aliados Health to host this event where partner agencies will hand out community resources, groceries, and school supplies. This collaborative effort ensures children can start kindergarten on time and have a successful start to their education.

The KRU provides all school-entry immunizations for FREE in one convenient visit, helping families meet state health requirements while keeping children and classrooms safe. These shots protect against measles, mumps, polio, and whooping cough—illnesses that can spread quickly in school settings. To learn more about what vaccines your child needs before kindergarten please visit the CDPH website page [Shots for School](#). Families of children who need school-entry physicals or routine well-child checks will be referred to Solano County Health & Social Services' Family Health Services after vaccinations are complete. This referral will be made

at the event. Please note: No screenings or physicals will be conducted on the day of the event.

Required Vaccines for School Entry Include:

- DTaP (Diphtheria, Tetanus, Pertussis)
- IPV (Polio)
- MMR (Measles, Mumps, Rubella)
- Varicella (Chickenpox)
- Hepatitis B

No appointment is necessary to receive these free vaccines. Parents are encouraged to bring their child's immunization records and insurance information, although no child will be turned away. This is a free, family-friendly event designed to make it easier for parents and guardians to keep children healthy and ready for school. We welcome all community members to stop by, get connected, and take advantage of these free services. The KRU is part of a broader campaign to raise awareness about the importance of childhood immunizations and routine check-up visits with a provider to make sure that children have a smooth transition entering school for the first time.

Vallejo City Unified Seeks Community Volunteers for Surplus Property “7-11” Committee



From a Vallejo City Unified School District press release:

Vallejo City Unified School District (VCUSD) calls civic-minded volunteers to serve on a newly formed Surplus Property Advisory (7-11) Committee. This committee is an independent, citizen-led body that evaluates district real estate

assets in the wake of recent school closures and consolidation decisions.

Earlier this year, VCUSD's Board of Education voted to close two schools for the 2025-26 academic year, launching the first phase of a broader consolidation plan designed to stabilize the district's finances while preserving high-quality learning for every student. To ensure transparency and broad community input as the district reviews its real estate portfolio, the Board has directed staff to convene a second 7-11 Committee, named because state law requires seven to eleven members who collectively reflect the community's diversity.

"Our schools are the heart of Vallejo," Superintendent Rubén Aurelio said. "By bringing parents, educators, taxpayers, business owners, and other key voices to the table, we can make thoughtful, community-driven decisions that safeguard VCUSD's long-term financial health and keep students squarely at the center of every discussion."

Guided by California Education Code § 17389, the 7-11 Committee will:

Study district-owned properties that may be underutilized or designated as surplus

Weigh instructional needs, enrollment trends, fiscal realities, and community input.

Recommend whether specific properties should be retained, leased, sold, or repurposed.

Report its findings to the Board of Education for final consideration.

VCUSD seeks applicants who mirror Vallejo's rich diversity and can take a district-wide view. Per state guidelines, the committee must include representatives from:

The business community, landowners and renters (with an emphasis on neighborhood associations), teachers, school administrators, parents/guardians of current VCUSD students, individuals with specialized knowledge (construction, environmental impact, legal contracts, building codes, zoning, etc.)

Applicants should commit to approximately four evening meetings lasting at least two hours on June 5, June 26, July 10, and July 24, plus limited preparation time to review materials. Dates and times are subject to change.

Interested community members can fill out the [English](#) or [Spanish](#) application on the district's [7-11 Committee webpage](#) and submit it to the district via the online form. You can

also download it from the same links and email it to rightsize@vcusd.org or submit it to the district office by **5 p.m. on Tuesday, May 27**. VCUSD staff and board members will review all submissions, considering the applicant's alignment with the committee's diversity requirements and ability to commit to the meeting schedule. Appointed members will be selected at the Board meeting on Wednesday, June 4.





Bay Area Butterfly Festival



Monarch butterflies play a crucial role in regulating our ecosystems and pollinating plants — including the crops we rely on for food. One out of every three bites of food we eat is thanks to pollinators like the Monarch butterfly. Without pollinators, our entire food web could unravel.

After two years of counts averaging 116,000 Western Monarch butterflies, only 5,407 of these orange-and-black beauties were counted in their winter groves during the most recent winter. (Data from Xerces Society.) This population count shows a heartbreaking decline of 95% for Monarchs, who are dying off due to pesticides and habitat loss.

You can learn more about Monarchs and how to support them at the Bay Area Butterfly Festival on **Sunday, June 1 at the Mare Island Promenade in Vallejo from 10 a.m. - 5 p.m.** There will be fun for the entire family, with interactive stations, presentations, music, vendors, arts and crafts, food & drinks, and more!

Speaker Series - Reuse and Reconciliation: Tiffany's Ecclesiastical Designs and Civil War Memory



In the late 19th and early 20th centuries, leaded-glass memorial windows were among Louis Comfort Tiffany's most highly visible and sought-after works of art. To meet the growing demand for his firm's coveted window designs, and to accommodate a variety of budgets, Tiffany frequently adapted and reused existing design cartoons for new window commissions.

The lecture will be from 3 to 4 p.m., Sunday, June 22, at St. Peter's Chapel, 1181 Walnut Avenue on Mare Island in the city of Vallejo.

In this lecture, Dr. Rideout will start with a look at a history of the Tiffany Studios, including the innovative glass techniques Tiffany developed and used to create his luminous designs. She will then explore the Tiffany-designed St. Peter's Chapel windows as part of a network of commission sites featuring similar designs, from New

York to Virginia to Texas. Created in the decades following the Civil War, these windows formed a visual cohesion which united the sites across sectional lines, even as reconciliation remained fraught at the turn of the century.

The event will open at 2:30 p.m. to give you time to enjoy the Tiffany windows before the lecture. After the event, join us outside the Chapel where you can meet Dr. Rideout and enjoy a glass of wine or beer.
