#### **ARPA Projects for BH:**

On September 27th, Solano BH received approval from the Board of Supervisors on recommendations for the use of Federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to support 4 projects that aligned with Board-approved categories. Full details on the proposals can be found here:

- 1. **Mental Health Treatment Facility Funds** to fund Year 2 operations cost for the new 32-bed treatment facility that will be operated by Y3C staring January 1, 2023.
- 2. **Substance Use Treatment Facility Funds**: to support BHCIP grantees via an RFP in funding gaps that will help build up to 62 substance use residential and withdrawal management (Detox) beds in Solano.
- 3. **BH Internship Program**: to fund year 1 & 2 of an expanded program to offer internship opportunities across various levels of trainees like peer volunteers, clinicians, psychologists & psychiatry/medical to improve recruitment efforts.
- 4. **BH & Courts Mapping:** to fund consultation support to develop an updated Sequential Intercept Model map for Solano supporting jail diversion, mental health and drug court, and other new initiatives with local leadership and community involvement.

**Opioid Settlement Funds-** Solano County has received notice of upcoming Opioid Settlement Distribution <u>Funds</u> and are creating a plan to address overdose prevention and opioid use. Counties and cities get to keep their funding or decide if to reallocate to a County to lead the efforts. So far, we will be receiving funds from 3 cities (total amounts pending, re: county allocation and potentially some cities) and will continue to plan and engage in community feedback on needs.

**Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) Training-** BH hosted its fist CIT training for law enforcement and first responders during mental health week, October 3-7, 2022. The inaugural class included 19 officers from Fairfield PD, Rio Vista PD, Benicia PD, Sheriff, and Travis AFB. This is the first time Solano County will have its own 40-hour course following fidelity, known as the "Memphis Model", through <u>CIT International</u>. The training provides information on various diagnoses & includes panels and presentations from people and families with lived experience, a hearing voices simulation exercise, de-escalation techniques, suicide prevention, cultural humility, vicarious trauma, and self-care for officers, as well as an overview of our service array and resources. Our goal is to increase the number of trained CIT officers throughout the county

that are better equipped to handle mental health crisis, coordinate with mobile crisis teams, and bring about improved interactions and reductions in incidents for the individuals and families we serve. Through an ARPA approved project for BH, we will be facilitating the Sequential Intercept Model (SIM) mapping that links this evidence-based practice to the continuum in relation to our jail and courts to reduce entry into the justice system. This was made possible through dedicated work from Solano BH CIT certified coordinators, <a href="Fairfield PD">Fairfield PD</a>, <a href="NAMI Solano">NAMI Solano</a> and the <a href="Solano County Sheriff's office">Solano County Sheriff's office</a>. MH Workforce Crisis- BH has 45 current vacancies, which is about a 19-20% vacancy rate — the majority of which are clinicians, psychiatrists/NP/PA, nurses, and mh specialists/case managers (hardest to fill critical positions). Recruitment and retention continue to be an issue and direct service staff are taking on extra work from the vacant positions to ensure we serve clients per state timeline requirements. We are seeing a higher acuity in the need of our clients and community and crises happening more frequently. Our administrative staff are overloaded with the increasing state mandates, grants, reporting and requirements (Kaiser Carve out, CalAIM, etc.) The new ARPA approved internship program may help recruit new students to work for Solano BH but the benefits of that program will likely take about 1-2 years to fully reap. We continue to discuss with HSS admin/HR for help in updating classifications and salaries to ensure there is parity with competitors and growing demand.

MH Facility Ribbon Cutting- The Ribbon cutting ceremony is scheduled for 2 pm on 10/25/22 to inaugurate the new MH Treatment Facility housed in the Beck campus. The contractor, Yolo Community Care Continuum (YCCC) or Y3C, was approved by the Boad of Supervisors on 9/13/22 and is on target for submitting the board and care Community Care Licensing (CCL) application and will begin planning staffing and program plans as well as coordination with referral sources for residents to move in for the facility to open in January 2023. Board members are invited to join.






